GENERAL NEWS.

President Loubert is paying a visit to the Czar of Russia at St. Petersburg.

The case against Mrs. Carrie Nation, for joint-smashing came to trial at Topeka, Kansas, Tuesday in the district court and was dismissed on a technicality. Mrs. Nation has one more trial to face, resulting from her raids of more than a year ago.

For the third time in the history of Bellevue hospital, New York, a case of Addison's disease has appeared there. The patient is Mrs. Catherine Blossi. The disease affects the kidneys, and the sufferer turns first yellow and then black as a negro.

Archie McEachern, the well-known bicycle rider of Toronto, while being paced by a motor tandem at Atlantic City, Tuesday, met with an accident which resulted in his death 20 minutes later. The accident was the result of the breaking of the chain on the motor cycle. He collided with the motor.

"Dummy" Rowan of Park City and "Deafy" Thompson of Montana, met at Salt Lake, Monday night, in a contest for the deaf-mute championship of the world. The pugilists fought at catch weights. Rowan, scaling 169 pounds and Thompson 145. Thompson was much the cleverer, but the heavier weight of his opponent was too much for the Montana man and he went down and out in the tenth round, from a vicious swing on the jaw.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Machinery arriving at Eugene for the new woolen mill being built there. Edward Wand, who died at his home at Viento, on the Columbia, May 9, was an Oregon pioneer of 1853. He was married in Ohio, and came to California in 1853, moving to Oregon shortly afterwards. He lived at Eugene 35 years.

A large party which is to explore and map the central part of Alaska for the United States geological survey, has left Seattle for Cook's Inlet. The party is in general charge of Alfred H. Brooks, director of the geological survey in Alaska.

William Eudey died at his residence in Oregon City, Monday, aged 77 years. He was born February 14, 1825, in Cornwall, England, and came to Oregon in 1856. On the day following last Christmas he fell and fractured his hip joint. Death was due to inflammation of the bowels.

A petition in bankruptcy was filed in the United States district court at Portland by Adams Schmidt, of Eugene. The petitioner stated that his liabilities were \$4500 and that this sum was due to S. H. Friendly, of Eugene, on a deficiency judgment. He had no assets.

Petitions in bankruptcy were filed in the United States court in Portland, as follows: Thomas Chandler, farmer, Elgin, Union county; liabilities \$29,071; no assets. M. A. Stevenson, farmer, Elgin; liabilities \$3542.98; assets, \$340. Charles Cross, Elgin; liabilities, \$1070.70; assets, \$300.

No trace has been found of Mrs. Mamie Francis Geiger since she left the home of her friend, Mrs. A. Y. Lowery, in Portland, April 28. She said she was going back to St. Vincent's hospital, where she had been in attendance as a nurse, but a letter which she sent back to her friend showed she had other plans.

LEWIS-CLARKE FAIR

MEETING OF CITIZENS AT COMMERCIAL ASSOCIATION ROOMS.

The 1905 Enterprise Discussed and Mayor Hailey Delegated to Appoint Committee to Solicit Subscriptions to Stock.

The meeting of citizens Wednesday evening at the Commercial Association rooms, called for the purpose of discussing the Lewis and Clark 1905 centennial, with representatives of Portland bodies, in the persons of H. S. Rowe, mayor of Portland; F. E. Beach, president of the Portland Board of Trade; A. J. Capron, of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and J. M. Long, one of the advisory committee of the Lewis and Clark fair, was well attended by the business men and property owners of Pendleton.

After selection of C. S. Jackson as chairman of the meeting, Mayor Rowe, of Portland, was called on and responded with a brief talk, introducing the matter to be considered. He was followed by F. E. Beach, of the Portland Board of Trade, who touched upon some of the points to be considered by the meeting. After Mr. Beach came A. J. Capron, a member of the committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, who made a more lengthy statement of the enterprise to be carried forward in the interest of the great Northwest. Mr. Capron's speech was well received and created some little enthusiasm, as he pictured the good to the country and the people which would follow the holding of the Lewis and Clark exposition.

Following Mr. Capron, J. M. Long, of the Lewis and Clark advisory committee, was introduced. Mr. Long stated the object of the gathering, that he and the other gentlemen came to Pendleton, and had visited other points in Eastern Oregon, for the purpose of securing support, both financial and moral, for the great Lewis and Clark centennial to be. He described the enthusiasm which existed in Portland, by which Portland people in three days had been induced to subscribe \$330,000 to the stock of the enterprise.

It was desired to raise the stock subscriptions to \$500,000, of which Portland would contribute \$400,000 in money, and he hoped that the balance of the state could be induced to subscribe the remainder, \$100,000. He told of the wonderful growth in population and wealth that would be sure to flow to Oregon from the exposition, and declared that it would give Oregon a million people by the beginning of 1906. He revealed the opportunity placed before the Northwest by this fair and closed asking the people of Pendleton and Umatilla county to co-operate to the utmost of their ability in carrying to a successful conclusion an enterprise which promised untold benefit to the entire section "where rolls the Oregon."

It was the sense of the meeting that a committee of five be appointed to devise means of raising a stock subscription fund in Pendleton and Umatilla county, and Mayor Hailey was authorized to name the committee to carry forward the work. After brief remarks by T. C. Taylor, G. A. Hartman, H. F. Johnson, Mayor Hailey and C. E. Roosevelt, the meeting adjourned.

Mayor Hailey will appoint the committee before the close of the week.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

It is the 114th Meeting of the Kind of This Church.

New York, May 15.—The 114th Presbyterian general assembly was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. Henry C. Minton, D. D., at 11 o'clock today in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church. At 9 o'clock the chapel was opened to receive the credentials of the commissioners and alternates, and from that hour until the assembly convened the Rev. Dr. William H. Roberts, the stated clerk was kept busy distributing badges and assigning the delegates to their places. The galleries of the edifice were crowded to suffocation when the opening hymn was sung, the spectators joining with the commissioners and alternates in the rendition of the anthem. Spacious though it is, the church was not large enough to accommodate the crowds and many were turned away.

The various local and subcommittees are quartered in the chapel, and adequate arrangements have been made by those committees for the proper entertainment of the visitors. The sermon of the retiring Moderator, Dr. Minton, occupied the entire morning session and at its conclusion the assembly adjourned until a late hour this afternoon to prepare for the election of a new moderator, the most important practical business of the day. Of the several candidates in the field no one seems to have a decisive lead and all forecasts as to the outcome of the election are purely promiscuous.
