THE CAMP MEETING

FIRST SERVICE LAST NIGHT
CONTINUES FOR TEN DAYS.

Elder A. J. Breed Addressed a Large Audience—Said a Good Word for Pendleton and its Business Men.

The Adventists' camp meeting opened Thursday night, as had been announced, and in addition to the large number of people on the ground from out of town, who had come to attend the meetings, a large delegation from the town attended the first service.

The large tent, with a seating capacity of almost 1500 people, was almost full. The meeting opened with a song service and Elder A. J. Breed president of the conference, addressed the people. He did not preach what was called a sermon, but talked interestingly about the history and beginning of the work of the Seventh Day Adventists. He stated that 22 years ago, the first camp meeting was held in this conference jurisdiction and compared the present audience of these meetings to the 40 people who attended this first gathering.

During his talk, Elder Breed spoke very kindly of the treatment they had received from the people of Pendleton. He said: "I have been in many camp meetings, but I never have been in a city where we were received with more courtesy and good feeling than we have been in Pendleton. Everything possible has been done to make us feel at home and some of the most prominent business men of the city have come to us and told us that we could have anything we wanted."

The meeting then adjourned after the announcement that all who had come from afar and who were not provided with a place to sleep, would be provided for by applying to Rev. Martin.

Everything is to be carried on in an orderly manner on the camp grounds. The grounds now present a very neat appearance and it was announced last night that all who camped on the grounds would be required to see to it that no litter was allowed to gather around their tents. A committee

has been appointed to look after this and to see after the sanitary conditions of the camp. Everything is systematic and every hour will be occupied with public service or business meetings. Today the program is as follows:

The early bell rang at 5 and everybody was expected to arise at this time. The first services of the day were at 5:30, when a sermon was delivered in the main tent as well as the German tent. Elder Westhall preached in the German tent. He has labored among the Germans in South America and other places and speaks the language fluently.

At 7 o'clock the breakfast bell rang and at 8 all gathered at the tent again for worship. The conference convened at 9:30 and the business of the meeting was begun by the delegates from the different parts of the conference. The work of the conference occupied the time until 2:30, when another service was held in the tent.

This evening the services will be in the German tent at 5:30 and in both the main tent and German tent, the evening services will begin at 7:30. These services will last until about 9 o'clock, when the bell will ring for retiring. Then everybody will be expected to retire for the night and at 9:30 the bell will again ring for silence.

The above is about the order of the program that will be carried out on the camp grounds each day from now until the 25th.

The sermons will be preached by different preachers each day and the citizens of the town are cordially invited to attend any and all of the meetings.
