BALL--BASE--BALL

PENDLETON TEAM WINS ANOTHER GAME AT VANCOUVER

Have Won Nine Games Out of Eleven Played on Their Tour—Athena Defeated La Grande in a Score of 11 to 2—Other Ball News.

The Pendleton baseball team won the game again Thursday at Vancouver by a score of 4 to 2. Wilner and Brown were the battery. This makes 11 games the boys have played since leaving Pendleton on the morning of the 4th instant, and they have won all but two. They lost the first game played on the trip, which was at Walla Walla, and one at Everett. The team plays the Nonpareil team at Seattle today and will arrive home tomorrow evening to be in readiness for the game with the Yellow Kids Sunday afternoon.

For this game the O. R. & N. will give a special rate of 75 cents for the round trip. Those going can go on the 8 o'clock and return on the 5:20, or on the special that leaves Pendleton at 1 p. m.

Athena Won at La Grande.

Osborn's Yellow Kids passed through Pendleton this morning from La Grande, where they played Tuesday and Thursday with the locals. Three games were to have been played between these teams, but owing to rain Wednesday the game was called off. La Grande won the first game by a score of 9 to 8, but Athena won the game Thursday by a score of 11 to 2. The Athena boys say that they got it handed to them by the umpire in the first game, to which was partly due their defeat, and then they played out of luck, while the La Grande boys played in luck all through. In the last game, Brown and Shea were the battery and they did excellent work. The fielding was also good, but the La Grande fielding was nothing extra. Casner, in the left field, however, did excellent playing for La Grande. The La Grande team has not had field practice and active work as Tuesday's game was the first they have played this season. The team has some good ball players, and when they get down to work will put up a good game.

Fourteen hits were made by the Athenas in the Thursday's game and two errors were marked against them, while La Grande only got five hits and made six errors. The next game for the La Grande team will be at Walla Walla, next Saturday. They will also play there Sunday and Monday, at Athena Wednesday and Thursday, and in Pendleton Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Wonders vs. Indians.

Beginning at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon Manager Roy Alexander's team, called the "Wonders," will play the Umatilla Indians on the local diamond. The real Indians are the same team that played the Rooters last Sunday and a good game is promised. The line-up of Alexander's team is: Mays, center field; Alexander, 2nd base; Penland, left field; Kruger, short stop; Hartman, 3rd base; Froome, 1st base; Cronin, catcher; Robbins, pitcher; Renn, right field. Fifteen cents admission fee will be charged.

Woodmen vs. Pilot Rock.

The Woodmen of Pendleton have organized a baseball team and are going to Pilot Rock Sunday to play a team there. Pete Marsh is at the head of the Pilot Rock team and he is confident of winning this game, although the Woodmen have some good players and will make the boys from the rock play ball if they want to ride in the band wagon.

ATHENA MILL PROPERTY APPRAISED AT \$8000.

Will Be Sold to Satisfy Claims of Creditors—T. P. Page Sells His Athena Property and Will Leave Saturday for Southern California to Reside Permanently—Wheat Prospects Excellent.

Athena, Or., May 16.—The Athena Mill Company's plant at this place was appraised this week by order of the court. A valuation of about \$8000 was placed upon it. It will be sold to the best interests of all concerned. It is very desirable property and should not stand idle long.

T. P. Page, having disposed of his residence property here, will take his departure Saturday for the more congenial climate of Southern Cal., where he now proposes to make his future home, Andy McEwen having purchased the Page home, and will move his family to this city this week. Mr. McEwen will make a valuable acquisition to the number of substantial citizens who have lately decided to live in Athena.

A steady downfall of rain Wednesday afternoon, added materially to the cheering prospects of another good crop the coming harvest. The prospect at present being considered better than that of last year at this season.
