SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY

THOS, JAMES GETS THREE YEARS FOR BURGLARY.

Good Crop Prospects.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 16.-The annual crop report of the Lake Erie & Western railroad shows that the conditions along the line are favorable for a good crop of wheat, corn and oats. Fruit is also in good condition with the exception of peaches, which have suffered from the cold weather. The wheat acreage is about the same as last year in Ohio, and it is expected that the yield will be from 14 to 25 bushels an acre. The oats prospect is also good in Ohio, and in some places it is thought that the acreage will be 50 per cent, greater than last year. The corp crop is estimated to be from 15 to 30 per cent. heavier than last year. The conditions in Indiana and Illinois are about the same as in Ohio, and the report shows that many farmers have large quantities of corn stored.
