### REGISTRATION NEARLY 5000.

Notaries Went All Over the County Rounding Up the Don't Care Fellows.

While it is impossible to give the exact number of voters registered in Umatilla county at this time, as there are a great many names on blanks that were sent in at the last minute by notary publics who were out over the county, it is thought now, that very few who are entitled to a vote have been missed, and the registration will reach almost to the 5000 mark.

This is owing to the interest taken by both the republicans and democrats who have had men out traveling all over the county gathering up the straggling voters who were either too busy to get to town and register or did not take interest enough in the election to take the trouble to register.

For several days previous to the date of closing the registration books, six men, representatives of both parties, have been throughout the county rounding up the voters.
