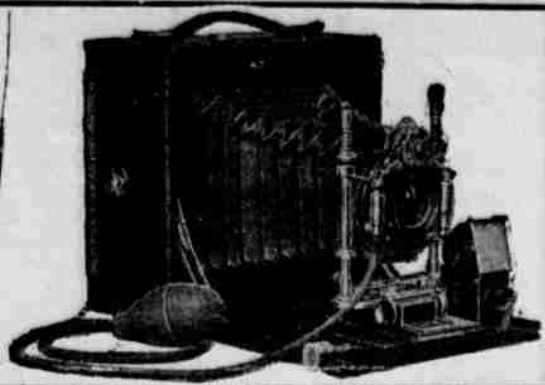

THE ATTORNEY-GENERALSHIP.

J. H. Raley, candidate for attorney-general on the democratic ticket, deserves the support of the voters of eastern Oregon regardless of party, particularly of the voters of Umatilla county. This is true because Mr. Raley is an eastern Oregon man, and as a state senator did excellent work for this section. Mr. Raley is an able lawyer, forceful and resourceful. As attorney-general he would serve the people regardless of all antagonistic influences. He possesses the capacity necessary to fill the office. He has the necessary vigor and energy to meet the duties of it.

The people of Eastern Oregon are well acquainted with the capacity of J. H. Raley to serve them in public office. If he is elected they know that he will enforce the law without fear of or favor to any interest. In Umatilla county he is still more intimately known and respected, and the vote he will receive will testify to the confidence the people have in him. Mr. Raley should carry Umatilla county by 500 votes over his republican opponent, and if he does not the people are unappreciative of his services as a public servant in other capacities.

A large number of republicans in Umatilla county will vote for him, because they know him to be worthy of their support and because they wish to testify to his fitness for the office for which he was nominated contrary to his wishes. The office of attorney-general sought J. H. Raley; he did not seek the office. It is a good sign when the office seeks the man, a sign to the voter that he is free from political entanglements and in a position to serve the people. It is a sign that the voter should not fail to interpret correctly.

WOULD BE A MISTAKE.

It is being circulated that it is the intention of President Roosevelt to take the stump in the congressional campaign this fall. Theodore Roosevelt is a positive character, desirous of doing something, of leading in accomplishment, but the East Oregonian does not believe that he will do so undignified a thing as to go upon the stump while he is president.

If he does do so the people should rebuke him for such a partisan and uncalled for act, by defeating those whom he advocates for office. No matter how necessary the need for such action, the president of a republic is not justified in making such a display of himself. When the administration has to be sustained in this way -- is time for its defeat.

Mr. Roosevelt has the rights of any free citizen and can do as he pleases in this connection, but good advice to him is don't, don't. He is the president of the whole people, not that of a party. If he advocates on the stump the interests of a party he will belittle himself as president and become less influential in the great office.

DEMOCRATS GET TOGETHER.

Reports from Washington, Boston and New York show that the eastern and southern democrats are rapidly getting together and will make a formidable fight in the congressional elections this year and may possibly achieve successes that will render them even more formidable in the presidential contest in 1904. The movement is in the direction of free trade and it is quite probable the country may have to undergo the disturbing agitations of another fight on the protective system under which our industries have been built up.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Times says: "The harmony movement originated in the senate, which is the hotbed of the reaction against Bryan. It is not too much to say that there is not a single thick and thin Bryan man left in the senate. The harmony movement is not the off-spring of any 'gold-bugs' or 'traitors.' It proceeds from men who have hitherto been counted as Bryan's strongest supporters, and they are advising the followers to disregard his counsels. While these men are engineering this movement they have no intention of putting the south unduly forward, or grabbing at the honors. What they want is national victory, first in 1902 and then in 1904. They have become convinced that all hopes of making important inroads in the west are all rainbows, and that to win they must have the east and what they can get of the central states."

Having thus obtained the support of the south, the eastern leaders and organs are rapidly formulating a campaign on a platform of two planks—anti-protection and anti-imperialism. The party has no affirmative programme to offer. It will enter the contest strictly as a party opposition. This fact, however, does not weaken its chances. In fact, it is perhaps more dangerous by confining itself to opposition than it could be by attempting to defend an affirmative platform.

One of the significant features of the movement is the application that has been made by Congressman Griggs of Georgia, chairman of the congressional campaign committee, to leading democrats in the east for counsel and assistance instead of turning to Bryan and his western populists. Hill, Whitney, Olney, Lamont and men of that type have been summoned to the party councils, and the Bryan followers have been ignored.

As a result of this movement there has been an increased activity in the democratic circles, and it is certain democracy is not going into the campaign either as a demoralized or a hopeless party. Some of their political experts are already figuring out the election of a democratic house of representatives. It is known that a considerable number of republicans in the present house were elected by very narrow majorities, and a small amount of discon-

tent growing out of the Cuban reciprocity and some other blunder on the part of the republican leaders may bring about the defeat of several of them.

In addition to the gains hoped for through republican mistakes the democrats are counting largely upon the inevitable desire of a considerable number of the people for a change. It is pointed out that in the fourteen congressional elections that have taken place in the last twenty-eight years the democrats have been successful eight times and the republicans six times; that in no case has either party carried the house in three successive elections except in three successive elections since 1894. Bryanism put the democratic party virtually out of the field in the east, and so long as Bryan was the recognized leader of the party it had no chance; but now that he is set aside it is believed by sanguine democrats that the law of mutability in the public mind will reassert itself and democracy will win.

Such reasoning may not be very sound, but there is enough in the situation to warn republicans that they cannot afford to make blunders nor to count upon democratic blundering. The split in the party on the Cuban reciprocity question, involving, as that measure does, something of surrender of protection principles, is ominous of disaster. The effort to force the renomination of Gage is perilous so far as this state is concerned. In short, it is time for republicans to take heed of what they are doing. The democrats are really uniting and republicans must not divide.—San Francisco Call.

T. G. Hailey, district attorney of the Sixth Judicial District, will take the stump in behalf of Colonel J. H. Raley, democratic nominee for attorney-general. He will accompany J. K. Weatherford, democratic nominee for congressman of the first district.
