THE POLITICAL HORIZON.

Harvey W. Scott, the editor of the Portland Oregonian, has been in the east for several weeks, at least he remains away from Oregon and out of the political fight now being waged in this state. Mr. Scott is a little inclined to avoid political strife and seeks seclusion, whenever he has the opportunity, from participation in it.

There are things that go to show that the cards are being cut so as to insure Mr. Scott a hand that may land him in the United States senate, without any apparent effort on his part. The failure of the republican state convention to endorse and nominate a candidate for the United States senate was the first sign in that direction; the departure of Mr. Scott for the East in the beginning of the campaign was the second sign; the narrow partisan attitude taken in the campaign by the Portland Oregonian, and a great mistake, was the third sign; the recent outspoken declaration of Political Manager Matthews, of the republican machine, against the senatorial candidacies of C. W. Fulton, the Astoria statesman, and Governor T. T. Geer, is the fourth sign, and the most ominous and succulent one.

So it does appear that a political game is being played to succeed Joseph Simon with Harvey W. Scott, and it would not be a bad thing for the state of Oregon if it should carry, but there are indications that several costly mistakes have been made in the consummation and carrying out of this political enterprise.

The republican cards have been played so badly that the chances are favorable to a democratic victory in Oregon on the second of June and the complete annihilation of the work of the republican machine, with all the aspirations, hopes and undertakings of those connected with it.

It would be a most remarkable happening if Oregon went democratic, but there are signs that that is the direction the people of the state are "flying with their own wings" at this time, and their votes may sweep the republicans out and the democrats into office.

Let it be borne in mind that those democrats who reach office on June 2 must prove faithful to the trusts imposed in them by the people, for it is on account of republican unfaithfulness in office that the people are on the eve of making a change in their public servants.

It appears that the portion of the Rosebud Indian reservation in South Dakota to be opened the coming summer contains more than 400,000 acres of excellent land. This will make homes for 2500 families, allowing them 160 acres each, and 160 acres will support a family comfortably upon that fertile soil. The change from Indian tepees and scattered corn patches to cultivated farms, villages, churches and schools will be a welcome one to the people of South Dakota.

The railroads have declared that they do not want old men and even at thirty-five a man has outlived his youthfulness. That is bad enough, but now comes the cry from the Methodist Episcopal conference in the state of New York that the church being lumbered up with old men and that congregations demand

young preachers. After a while there will be nobody left to take the old men but the devil, and he may then be no longer in business.

President Schwab, of the steel trust, bought a paper from a blind newsboy in New York the other day and gave him a \$5 dollar bill for it. We will venture to say that Mr. Schwab never had more real fun for \$5 in his life. And besides, the boy did about as much for the \$5 as Schwab.

CUBA LIBRE.

It is a source of gratification to all Americans and to all lovers of liberty throughout the world that Cuba has at last taken her place among the nations. In this country it is a subject that will always be remembered with pride because of the high part taken in this event by our own government and people. Without that Cuba would be today a gasping victim impaled upon a spear. We may well forget some errors in policy and some expressions of selfishness that have appeared among ourselves which seemed to indicate ulterior motives at war with our expressed purpose when we intervened between Spain and the island.

The new republic begins with an effusion of patriotic feeling worthy of the people who know the cost of liberty and the watchfulness that must maintain it. The honor paid to the patriotic dead, to those who long ago were martyred in what seemed a vain struggle, and to the living who staked all that men have to give, for freedom, is a most wholesome evidence of the patriotic spirit that will endure and grow stronger with time.

Patriotism is the cementing principle of all republics. It is that love of country which has no relation to parties nor dynasties, but regards them as passing and impermanent things, while the land and the people it nourishes from generation to generation are the object of popular love and solicitude.

A gentleman from the United States who recently spent some time abroad, was one day riding in one of the fine parks of Vienna. The driver was evidently impressed by the American's admiration of the beautiful grounds and said to him: "It is very kind of the emperor to permit his people to enjoy this park. He is very good to his people." The answer was a clear-cut American expression to the effect that the people were very kind to the emperor, because they permitted him to live in splendor in a palace which they provided and to pretend ownership of their parks and places, which he could not create nor care for.

The Cuban people have been reared and schooled to that subervency to a dynasty and to regal authority which assumed to permit them to live and imperfectly enjoy that which proceeded from their own toil and strength. It is high evidence of their spirit and of the force of our nearby example that they cast off this spirit of dependence and submission and look themselves in the face as the owners of the island and the source of all that has been made to bear and to be.

They have neither hatred nor gratitude to express toward Spain, but exulted in their own enfranchisement. Though we are distant from the scene of their emergence into liberty, the American pulse quickens in contemplating it. The church bells tolled a requiem for all the patriots who perished in the long combat against power and oppression. Martí and Garcia were not forgotten, and they and all the dead were blessed by the prayers of patriots. The free people marched to the fortress Cabanas and stood upon the spot where patriotic prisoners had been manacled and shot, and where the daily slaughter had reddened the ground with the blood of men and boys whose crime was love of country. They were the nameless host of martyrs. They died in despair. Their last look was upon a land where power knew no mercy and the greatest crime was patriotism. Forlorn and

friendless they perished. But their grateful countrymen, exulting in the liberty of which their blood was the chrism, did not forget them, and the place of death was crowned with flowers and hallowed with grateful tears.

In these days when the rights of the strong are vaunted as the only rights of the world it is a stirring spectacle to see a physically weak people, few in numbers, strong only in purpose and great in their love of self-government, take their place among the nations with a sovereignty that is equal in dignity to the oldest and proudest of the nations of the earth. Americans who comprehend clearly the mission of their own country rejoice with a great joy as their own flag is furled over Morro Castle and the bright banner of a new republic takes its place.

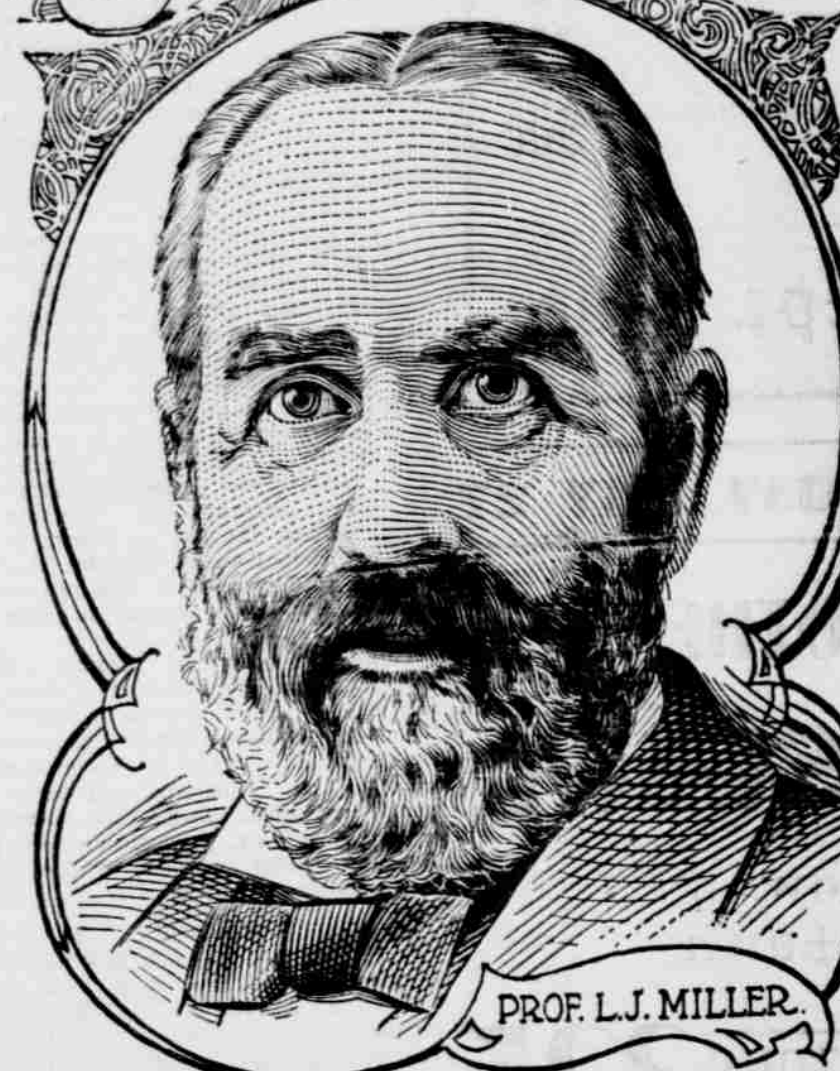
