GRAND LODGE A. O. U. W.

WILL MEET AT PORTLAND
JUNE 10TH TO 17TH.

A Week of Business and Festivities Will Be Attended by Members of A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor From All Over United States.

Although the delegates have not been elected by the local lodge to attend the national meeting of the grand lodge, A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor, at Portland, June 10-17, many of the prominent members are laying their plans to attend.

The supreme lodge will open Tuesday, June 10, at 9 a. m., and it is expected that the business of the first day will be finished by 1 o'clock. In the afternoon places of interest will be visited by the out-of-town delegates and visitors and a formal reception will be tendered to the ladies of Superior Lodge in the Woodmen hall, on the east side.

On Wednesday, the 11th, the entire day will be devoted to business of the two national bodies and the drill contest of the Degree of Honor, which will be held in Arion hall. These annual contests create considerable interest and are looked forward to with pleasure by the lodge.

On Thursday, June 12th no business will be transacted; instead an excursion will be run to Astoria and all the members of the two orders are expected to go and will be banqueted and entertained by the Astoria Workmen lodges and citizens.

Two hours will be given to this reception and then if the tide is favorable the steamer Potter will carry the guests over to Fort Canby, where they will be permitted to feast their eyes on the waves of the Pacific Ocean. Luncheon will be served on the Potter and the party will return to Portland about 10:30 p. m.

Friday, June 13, will be devoted to legislation by both bodies. In the evening the national memorial services will be held in the Taylor street church. Appropriate music will be rendered and eulogies will be delivered for those who have passed away and who have been in any way connected with the supreme lodge.

On Saturday evening, June 14, a monster public demonstration will be held. Twelve bands will participate in the parade and red fire will be burned galore. Large delegations will be present and take part.

Nothing of special importance will take place then until Tuesday, June 17, when a trip will be taken through the Willamette valley by way of Corvallis. The party will go up on the east side of the river and return on the west side. The Greater Salem Commercial Club, in conjunction with the Degree of Honor and Workmen lodges of Salem, will serve a luncheon in Salem, and two hours will be devoted to visiting about the city.

CHARGED WITH LARCENY.

Claimed That George Lubken Took Eggs and Butter From His Employer.

A suit against George Lubken charging him with the theft of small articles in the way of eatables, from the Leezer bakery, has been occupying the attention of Judge John McCourt most of today.

Louis Riemann, who recently purchased the bakery, is the prosecuting witness and he alleges that Lubken took two rolls of butter, 10 dozen eggs, two loaves of bread and some spices, and converted them to his own use. The accused man is a baker and has been working in the Leezer bakery until recently, when he quit Riemann and went to Hohbach's bakery, where he is working now. The case is being heard before the following jurymen: Henry Shockey, R. J. Stubblefield, Fritz Buggerman, James Laing, Charles Fuqua and D. L. West.

After hearing all the evidence introduced, Deputy District Attorney R. S. Bryson moved that Lubken be dismissed for lack of evidence to convict, and Judge McCourt dismissed the case and the jury.

Whisky Case on Trial.

W. E. Crall, employed at the Columbia saloon, who was arrested last week for selling liquor to Indians, had his hearing today before United States Commissioner John Halley, and was bound over to the federal court in the sum of \$1000. United States Marshal Zoeth Houser and Deputy United States Attorney Edward Mays, of Portland, were here looking after the case. Crall gave bonds and is allowed his liberty.

Bishop Pleads Guilty.

W. H. Bishop, arrested Tuesday in Athena for the theft of a coil of hose from Penland Brothers' lodging house, was taken before Judge Fitz Gerald this forenoon and waived examination. Bishop acknowledges taking the hose and selling it, giving as his only excuse that he was under the influence of liquor. He says he will plead guilty, but will have to wait a few days until District Attorney Halley returns from Western Oregon and then he will be taken before District Judge Ellis and receive sentence.
