THE ANNUAL SALE

WOOL GROWER'S ASSOCIATION OPENS HERE TOMORROW

Believed that Operations in Wool Here Tomorrow and the Next Day Will Run into Hundreds of Thousands of Pounds—Outlook This Year is as Good as Usual.

In accordance with the time honored custom, the annual sales by the Oregon Wool Growers' Association will commence in this city tomorrow, Thursday, May 29, and continue throughout Friday.

Already the wool growers have commenced to arrive and it is expected that the operations of the association here will result in the sale of several hundred thousands pounds of fleeces.

From this city the association will move to Heppner, in observance of the following itinerary: Heppner, June 4, June 5; The Dalles, June 9 and 10; Shaniko, June 12 and 13; Pendleton, June 16 and 17; The Dalles, June 20 and 21; Heppner, June 25 and 26; Shaniko, June 30.

Each town is to be visited twice four separate days of sales being held in most of them. It is said the association expects to see most of its wool sold by that time.

Umatilla county's clip this year aggregates about 2,500,000 pounds, the wool being almost uniformly of fine quality. In the winter there was not a particularly bright outlook, but sheep fattened on the unusually early grass, made shearing early and the clip clean and fine.

The sheepmen of Umatilla and Morrow counties are now looking toward summer pasture, and a number of bands have already been driven to the mountains.

Except in a few minor sectional cases no attempt has been made this year to partition range among rival stockmen. So far no instances of trouble have been reported, but only a part of the sheepmen have driven into the mountains.

Inactivity marked the earlier weeks of the wool season because of the strike in the American Woolen Company's mill in the east. The American Wool Company handling almost half of the wool product of the United States, caused a partial paralysis of the wool business in many quarters, and the effect one the market here and in Morrow county was very noticeable.

In spite of this, however, the scouring mills here have been buying quite freely. At the end of the first week in May this big plant had nearly 1,000,000 pounds secured in Umatilla and Morrow counties and in Washington. It now has almost as much more, and all things taken together, the season is really no farther behind than last year, because the clip came earlier and buyers were earlier in the market. In consequence they have as much wool now as they had at this time last year, though there was not much free selling for a time.

REMANDED FOR TRIAL.

Supreme Court Holds Insufficient Plea for Demurrer in Interesting Case.

The first decision from the supreme court of the state of Oregon, which was held in Pendleton during the first week in May, has been received by Deputy Supreme Court Clerk Lee Moorhouse. This is a case entitled Fred Nodine vs. the First National Bank of Union, a private corporation, and involves \$17,213.78 alleged to

have been placed with defendant and which defendant refused to return to plaintiff. The defendants set up in their answer to the charges that plaintiff had drawn the amount deposited with the bank except \$4.80, and they had a settlement and this amount was agreed upon between both sides to be correct.

Supreme Judge C. J. Bean held that the answer of defendants did not contain a sufficient plea for the demurrer and the judgment of the lower court in giving the suit to plaintiff would have to be reversed and the cause remanded for new trial.

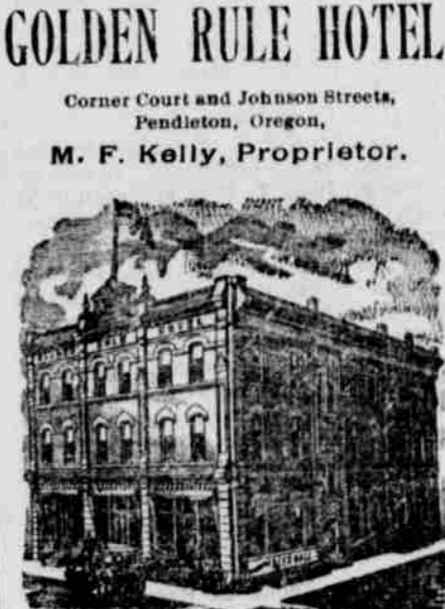
