PENDLETON BEAT COLFAX

WON FIRST OF TWO GAMES PLAYED TODAY.

Game Was a Spirited One and Abounded in Good Plays—Had Visitors Shut Out Until Last Inning. The Pendleton boys beat Colfax this morning in a fast game by a score of 4 to 1, the visitors making several errors while the local lads played almost a perfect game. Both teams were in fine fettle and fought the game out to the bitter finish, there being numerous plays which brought the crowd to its feet with wild cheers of delight.

The Pendleton fans are having a chance to get their fill of baseball again today. Two games were played on the Alta street grounds between the Indians and the Colfax team; one beginning at 10 o'clock this forenoon and the other this afternoon.

The Colfax boys, who arrived on the Thursday evening train, are husky looking fellows to go up against, and the Pendleton tossers did not go into the field with any too much confidence, for they were sure of having a hard fight.
