NATION HONORED HER DEAD

and Soldiers' monument in Riverside
Park, which cost a quarter of a mil-
lion dollars. A parade preceding the
unveiling consisted of veterans and
regulars to the number of several
thousands, was reviewed by General
Miles, Admiral Barker and Generals
Howard and Brooks, and Mayor Low.

Unveiled a Monument.

Philadelphia, May 30.—A \$20,000
bronze bust of the late President Mc-
Kinley was unveiled today in the cor-
ridor of the postoffice by the Letter
Carriers' Association of Philadel-
phia. Former Postmaster-General
Smith was the orator.

Distributed Flowers at Canton.

Canton, O., May 30.—McKinley Post
today distributed the many flowers
sent here for the casket and vault of
the late president. They were impar-
tial, placing only the customary
Grand Army emblem on the mar-
tyr's casket.

A Parade at Chicago.

Chicago, May 30.—Memorial day
here was observed by the usual pa-
rade, which had seven divisions, and
was reviewed by Governor Yates,
General MacArthur and Mayor Har-
rison.

Reinterred General Leavenworth.

Leavenworth, Kan., May 30.—The
bones of General Leavenworth, found-
er of Fort Leavenworth, were reinter-
red here today in the National
cemetery, General Butes presiding.
An immense parade of regulars and
veterans preceded the ceremonies.

At Lincoln's Tomb.

Springfield, Ill., May 30.—The ce-
remonies at Lincoln's tomb were of
the usual order, preceded by a pa-
rade.

Remembered in Cuba.

Havana, May 30.—The battleship
Mains was decorated today with
Cuban and American flags and rose
garlands and wreaths at the order
of President Palma. Services were held
in the churches.

At San Francisco.

San Francisco, May 30.—Observ-
ance of Memorial day was unusually
quiet. A military parade and distri-
bution of flowers by warships on the
waters of the bay were the only fea-
tures.

Dong Gong, the Chinese leper, who
has for four months past occupied a
house near Quarantine, at St. Louis,
has apparently recovered from his
malady and will be released within
two months unless the disease re-

THE WOOL SALES.

Three Hundred and Twenty-five
Thousand Pounds Sold Today.

Three hundred and twenty-five
thousand pounds of wool were sold
this forenoon in Pendleton by the
seated bid plan.

This was bought at the advertised
sale by the Umatilla Wool Growers'
Association and the price paid rang-
ed from 10 1/2 to 12 1/2 cents, which is
very satisfactory to the sellers. The
clips sold, the man sold to and the
amount as nearly as could be ob-
tained, is as follows:

The Cunningham clip of 130,000
pounds, and the J. E. Smith clip of
70,000 pounds, to E. W. Brigham, of
Boston; the E. A. Rugg clip of 35,000
pounds, to E. Y. Judd, of Pendleton;
the Doug Belts clip of 36,000 pounds,
the F. S. & A. P. Warner clip, and
the E. O. Evans clip, to George Col-
by, of Boston; the K. G. Warner clip
of 18,000 pounds and the Sam War-
ner clip of 7000 pounds, to Charles
Green, of San Francisco.

This afternoon several smaller
clips were sold, which amounted in
all to something like 50,000 pounds,
but the sales were too late to get the
names of the buyers and the individ-
ual amounts of each.

Elected Officers.

The wool growers of the county
met at the Commercial Association
rooms Thursday afternoon and elec-
ted officers for the Umatilla Wool
Growers' Association as follows:

Doug Belts, president; Herbert
Boylan, vice-president; J. H. Gwinn,
secretary and treasurer. Messrs.
Belts and Boylen succeeded them-
selves and Mr. Gwinn succeeded S. P.
Gould.

Plans for the coming year were dis-
cussed and arrangements made for
the wool sale by sealed bids this fore-
noon. The reason no wool growers
showed up with wool to sell yester-
day was because there was a mis-
understanding between the sellers
and buyers. The sellers understood
that they were to be at the Associa-
tion rooms and the buyers thought
the sellers were to be at the court
house. Consequently they did not
get together until it was too late to
make any deals. The wool growers
were at the Association rooms won-
dering why the buyers did not show
up, and the buyers were at the court
house swearing at the other fellows
because they did not come with the
wool to sell.
