BOOM AT WALLULA.

Caused by Agreement Between O. R. & N. and Northern Pacific.

Wallula, May 30.—There has been a boom in real estate and business prospects since the news reached this place that an agreement had

been reached between the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company and the Northern Pacific relative to the use of each other's lines and the building of the Snake river valley road to Lawiston. That this will mean a great deal to Wallula there is no one here doubts in the least. It has already been definitely given out that the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company cars will be taken straight through to Puget Sound points for loading and unloading, thus opening the ports of the northern section to Union Pacific trade and traffic, and there is little doubt the same thing will be true of Northern Pacific cars to Portland.

WALLOWA WOOL.

265,000 Head of Sheep in the Northern County.

A. B. Winfree, deputy district attorney, has returned to Baker City, says the Herald, after an absence of several weeks at Wallowa and Enterprise, in Wallowa county, where he went to attend a term of the circuit court. Attorney Winfree states the criminal docket was light and that little business was transacted, though an action to enjoin a ditch company from obstructing one of the county roads held on for a number of days. He says there are now approximately 265,000 sheep in that county and that the sheep men have inaugurated the use of machines for shearing. The machines are operated by water power and from 100 to 110 sheep can be sheared a day. This is about the same rate the animals can be sheared of their fleece by hand, but it is argued the machines are worked closer to the hide and thus more grease is secured, and more weight given the wool. He says one outfit has taken a contract to shear 75,000 sheep this season and that the shipments of wool from that section will be heavy.
