London, May 31 .- By order of the Colonial office a commission of engineers, experts in textiles, etc., sailed for South Africa today to investigate and report immediately on the re quirements of that country under the new conditions, and the prosprospects for the extension of British trade. The prompt action of the Colonial office is believed to be the result of information recently received of the activity of American firms, chiefly engineering, electrical and mining concerns who are preparing to dispatch heavy shipments to South Africa as soon as the cessation of histilities is assured.
