RELAYING O. R. & N. TRACK
ROAD BETWEEN HERE AND
UMATILLA REBUILDING.

Arrangements Made for Straightening and Shortening of the Line; Also the Laying of New Steel Along a Great Part of the Road.

M. J. Buckley, assistant superintendent of the O. R. & N. for the Oregon division, and J. D. Mattieson, general engineer, are in town from La Grande arranging for the laying of the steel on the road between here and Umatilla.

For the past several months crews of men have been at work on this line straightening out the crooks and working over the roadbed, making it much better and safer than formerly. This work was completed Saturday and turned over to the chief engineer, who will put a crew of steel layers and ballasters to work Wednesday morning getting the new bed ready for use.

New 80-pound steel is being laid and the kinks all straightened out of the line as far as possible. This will make the road much straighter, consequently safer and trains will be able to make better time on the line than before. The remodeling will be finished within a few weeks.

DISTINGUISHED FRENCHMEN.

The Rochambeau Party to Visit St. Louis and the World's Fair on June 4th.

World's Fair Grounds, St. Louis, June 3.—A letter has been received by the World's Fair management from M. Michel Lagrave, the French government's general commissioner for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, and a member of the Rochambeau party at Washington, formally accepting for himself and other members of the party the company's invitation to visit St. Louis. Mr. Lagrave says:

"I take pleasure in informing you that the following members of the party accept your invitation: The Count and Countess Rochambeau, the Count Lahaune de Lafayette, the Viscount de Chambrun, attache at the French embassy, Mr. J. Joan Guillemin, sub-director of the cabinet of the foreign minister, Mr. Robert de Dilly, secretary of the embassy, Mr. Jules Boenfoe, chancellor of the French embassy, the Baron de Rothiacob, officer of the French navy, Mr. Michel Lagrave, general commissioner of the French government to the Louisiana Purchase Exhibition, and Mr. Edward Wellhoff, his secretary.

"The said party accepts to visit St. Louis on the following dates: Tuesday, June 3, leave New York in the morning for St. Louis, Wednesday, June 4, arrival in St. Louis and visit the city. Thursday, June 5, visit of the city. Friday, June 6, leave St. Louis in the morning for New York by way of Chicago.

farmers and business men. The great movement presages the dawn of a vast trade and important changes are about to take place in the Dominion.

E. B. Walker, general manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, says that the psychological moment has come and Canada is on the eve of a great boom. He declares that the Americans see what is coming and are going into the northwest by tens of thousands. Their land agents are everywhere buying land wholesale.

F. A. Kenaston, of St. Paul, Minn., who is at Ottawa to take over the John Abell agricultural works, which has been bought out by the Minnesota Threshing Company, states that fully 200,000 Americans will go into the Canadian northwest this year. American companies are buying land by hundreds of thousands of acres, one syndicate alone having acquired a block of Canadian territory comprising over 1,000,000 acres of land.

What effect the increasing army of Americans will have politically is hard to tell. A good many Canadians take a pessimistic view of the situation and are predicting that the American invasion will naturally lead to an annexation movement and as the west will eventually dominate the east the confederation of the whole of North America will eventually follow. The census returns of the Dominion show that comparatively few of the American settlers in Canada are taking out naturalization papers. Altogether the immediate future is big with possibilities for this country, and current events will be watched with intense interest by people on both sides of the line.

GENERAL NEWS.

The census of Lincoln county, Wash., has just been completed by Assessor McRae and shows the total population to be 15,474. In 1900 it was 11,969.

At the close of business Saturday, the big West & Slade Mill Company, at Aberdeen, Wash., notified its employees that on and after Monday, June 2, the wages of every man in its employ would be raised 25 cents per day. This action is voluntary on the part of the mill company, and is the result of prosperous conditions prevailing.

Lawrence C. Phipps, the millionaire steel manufacturer, left Denver, Col., Saturday for Pittsburg. Before going he announced he had purchased 160 acres of land near Mountaire, a suburb of Denver, on which he proposes to establish a sanitarium for consumptives on the Trudeau cottage system. It will be established in memory of his mother, and called the Agnes Phipps Memorial Sanitarium. He paid \$50,000 for the land and will spend a much larger amount on improvements.

A daring jail break took place at Leadville, Col., about 3:30 p. m., Sunday. Five prisoners from the county jail are now at large. The jailer was in the front office when a trusty notified him that some of the prisoners were missing, and an investigation showed that "Pug" Ryan, Ben Gray, Herman Guest, Max Bowen and Jim Sullivan had escaped by an underground tunnel. They had sawed off the lock to a trap door leading to the sewer, broke the sewer wall and crawled to the outside of the jail through a small hole in the foundation wall.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The butchers of Portland have decided to adopt the "penny system" of doing business—that is, to make change down to a cent.

The funeral of Dr. Stephen A. Young was held Sunday afternoon at the Portland Crematorium. He was a pioneer of 1852 and formerly lived at McMinnville. A wife and one daughter, of Portland, survive him.

Work will be finished this month on the new lodge room which Architect George Williams is modeling out of the old opera house at Weston for the Odd Fellows, Woodmen of the World and the Knights of Pythias, at a cost of \$2500.

There is on exhibition at the First Bank of Sumpter 50 pounds of ore from the 300-foot level of the Golconda mine that will carry from \$5 to \$10 per pound in gold. The gold is mostly very fine, but can be seen throughout the rock. On the upper level, where the same shoot was struck, the ore was equally rich but of a softer character. The tunnels on the 400 and 500-foot levels are being extended to cut the shoot.

Albert Melver, the 16-year-old son of Contractor William Melver, of North Yakima, Wash., was accidentally killed Sunday by the discharge of a rifle. He worked as a herder in the sheep camp of George Harrison on the Upper Cowichee, and went to the woods with another herder to hunt squirrels. He laid the gun across a log, and in picking it up again, grasped it by the muzzle. The hammer caught on the log and discharged the load. The ball passed through his heart, killing him instantly.

WILL NOT BOND.

Walla Walla Turned Down Proposition to Bond for \$100,000.

Walla Walla, June 3.—The proposition to bond the city for \$100,000 for the purpose of extending the city water system was voted down by over two to one yesterday in an uneventful election. But 1212 voters registered for the election, and less than 1000 of these voted. It is impossible to get accurate figures, but the proposed improvement failed to receive any considerable vote in any part of the city save the section to the east, where water is scarce. In some precincts the vote was four to one.

The plan of bonding the city has been advanced by the council and the people have been careless most of the time, since the movement commenced last fall. A special election was called and that displeased the people, who could not understand the haste. The city owns the water plant, having bought it two years ago at a cost of \$250,000.
