The official returns may alter the present showing, though the general belief is that Chamberlain has won out. At republican headquarters they say they cannot figure out that Furnish wins, though they claim the margin is exceedingly close.

Chairman Matthews just said: "Furnish carries the state outside of Multnomah by 73, and this county is very close." Sam White says: "I am sure Chamberlain wins the state by close to 1000 plurality."

### CELEBRATE THE FOURTH.

Freewater is Planning a Big Celebration for July 4.

Freewater, June 4.—General satisfaction is expressed here at the way the election has come out and there are few who can be found to acknowledge voting in any other way than for Chamberlain.

The people of this burg are preparing for a grand celebration of the glorious Fourth of July, with fireworks, a street parade, reading of the Declaration of Independence, red lemonade and all the other usual features of such occasions. The day's program has been placed in the hands of a committee consisting of H. C. James, F. M. Evans, Charles Saunders, F. P. Miller and J. S. Vinson. It is expected that large crowds will be in town from the surrounding country and the people of Freewater confidently expect to have one of the most successful celebrations ever held in this part of the county.

### Sprained His Wrist.

Master George Beagle is carrying his right arm in a sling as the result of falling from a tree and spraining the wrist. The young man was playing with a lot of other boys, at the home of Mr. McLeod, corner of Webb and Johnson streets, and they were climbing the trees in front of the house. Master George fell from one and alighted on his hand with the above result. He will be compelled to keep the hand in a sling for several days.

### A Queer Case.

From Mountainhome comes a report of a wonderful case. John Ross janitor of the court house at that place, was suddenly stricken with blindness on Thursday of last week, and on Saturday morning his sight returned as suddenly as it was taken away. Physicians have not agreed as to the cause of the phenomena.

Rock Island Increases Capital. Chicago, June 4.—To provide means for important extensions to the Gulf of Mexico, and possibly toward the Pacific Coast, the stockholders of the Rock Island road at their annual meeting today voted to increase the capital stock from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000. This is the largest increase in capital since the consolidation in 1890. The stock was then \$41,960,000; in 1896 it was increased to \$46,500,000. In 1890 it was raised to the authorized limit of \$50,000,000. Last June it was increased to \$60,000,000. The funded indebtedness in the meantime has been increased from \$7,500,000 to \$68,000,000.

### Murderer Sentenced.

Mountainhome, June 4.—Judge Perky yesterday sentenced Frank Gardner, the slayer of Joe Montague to 10 years' imprisonment in the penitentiary, the maximum under the verdict of manslaughter.

## IS AN EASY MARK

LA GRANDE TEAM LOSES ITS SERIES WITH THE INDIANS.

Team Has Good Individual Players, But They Are Woefully Lacking in Team Work—Indians Will Cross Bats With Two Strong Teams Shortly.

"Poor La Grande!" "What is the matter with the Beet Pullers?"

"Are they ever going to get a team that can play ball?"

These are the remarks and questions that are being heard nowadays among the fans of Eastern Oregon.

The Pendleton baseball team has returned from La Grande, where they found the Beet Pullers an easy mark in two games and it would have been the same had the Monday's game not been called off on account of rain.

A heavy downpour caused this game to be called off in the second inning, when the score stood 5 to 1 in favor of the Pendleton boys. Had it been played out, the result would have undoubtedly been the same, as the Indians were going strong, while the local lads were plainly off their feed.

In the Sunday game the Pendleton players won by a score of 23 to 2 and the Tuesday's game was won by the Indians by a score of 13 to 7. Only seven innings were played.

This brings the per cent column of the La Grande players down to 182, and they will have to get a hustle on to redeem themselves. It is said that the La Grande team is composed of good players, but they are playing out of luck.

The Pendleton team returned home last night and are ready to cross bats with the Dayton team next Friday afternoon.

Two games are scheduled to take place in this city with the Hop Pickers from Everett on Saturday and Sunday, the 14th and 15th inst. It will be remembered that the Everett players are the only team that won out with the Pendleton team after leaving Walla Walla on their tour of a few weeks ago, and these games will be looked forward to with much interest by the local fans. The Everett team has the name of being one of the strongest aggregations of players in the Inland Empire, and the Indians will have to play ball to stay in the ring with them. However, Pendleton is proud of the record of her players and the local fans are willing to pit them against any team in the country.

### Where Briefness Went.

A Southern newspaper man, of not a great amount of experience outside of the small city in which he resides, tells a story that may furnish a lesson to many beginners, and to not a few men who occasionally sent matter to one of the New York dailies, picked up last summer what seemed to him a "big story."
