Brooks, democrat, commissioner, 191. Chamberlain's plurality in the county over Furnish is 681.

Sam White's Figures.

Chamberlain is now, according to he figures of State Chairman Sam White, 373 votes ahead of Mr. Furnish. The republicans, while acknowledging Chamberlain's election, declare that he will get in by less than 100. Governor Thayer, democrat, was elected over B. B. Beekman, republican, by about 40 votes.

The Big Pennsylvania Coal Strike Now Assuming Mastodon Proportions.

RIOTS ARE ALSO BECOMING

EXTREMELY IMMINENT.

Strikers Are Getting Restless and Are Burning Obnoxious Opponents in Effigy and Attacking Non-Union Workers With Stones and Other Pleasing Missiles.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 7 .- This city today became the headquarters for a strike of nearly 170,000 men, 18,000 miners of the bituminous region of West Virginia having gone out on a strike this morning; in addition to the 150,000 men now on strike in the anthracite fields. President Mitchell of the Mine Workers', will manage both campaigns from this city,

At the Bliss colliery this morning 100 strikers with their wives and children attacked two men who had disregarded the strike order, stones and sticks being freely used. Several were injured.

The women are doing effective work in inducing non-union men to join the strike and the coal and iron police to abandon the collieries. The s rikers leader declared today that

Hung "Pierp" Morgan.

Pierpont Morgan was hanged in elfigy here this morning. Large crowds pelted the effigy with stones until dispersed by the police.

Burned Non-Union Men.

Chamokin, Pa., June 7.—Several bodies of marching men, women and children surrounded the homes of the bosses here last night and built huge bonfires on which effigies of nonunion men were displayed. Nonunion men were pelted with stones by the strikers while at work today.

OFFICERS CATCH IT.

The Case of the Officers and Men of the Cruiser Chicago.

Washington, June 7 .- The navy department announces this morning that the court of inquiry held upon the officers and men of the cruiser Chicago, arrested at Venice for fight. ing, recommends a court-martial for Lieutenant John Doddridge, Captain Robert Wynle and Assistant Surgeon Robert Ledbetter, and that no further action be taken against Cadet James Kress and Private Wildred Lagley.

California vs. Chicago.

Chicago, June 7.-When the California and thicago track teams marched on the Marshall field, this afternoon, rain was threatening. The California team was the favorite when the first event was called, it being generally conceded that Chicago had no chance with Captain Maloney out, injuries preventing him from participating. Seventeen Sailors Drowned. Duluth, Minn., June 7 .- In a collis-

A great hole was stove in the Wilson's side and s.e sank almost immediately. Both vessels were valued at \$75,-000. The Hadley was badly damaged but managed to reach the shore where she was beached.

Collision Between Trolley Cars.
