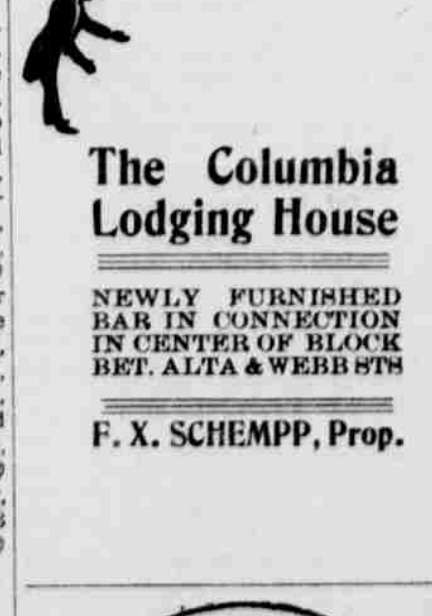
The Chamberlains Win.
