A. O. U. W. DELEGATES

TO CONVENTION OF GRAND LODGE AT PORTLAND.

Splendid Train With 250 Delegates From All Parts of the United States, Passed Through Pendleton This Morning.

At 8 o'clock this morning the city was overrun with men and women wearing on their breasts ribbons labeled with the mystic letters A. O. U. W.

A special train of 11 coaches pulled into the Pendleton yards at that hour and 250 hungry delegates to the big A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor convention were turned loose to get breakfast.

This train was made up in Chicago and has been run as a special all the way across the continent. It carries delegates from lodges and jurisdictions of the A. O. U. W. in all parts of the United States, comprising one of the most representative gatherings of prominent members of the order ever congregated.

The delegates were met at Huntington by a committee headed by Governor Geer, and welcomed to Oregon. At The Dalles they will be met by a second committee, headed by Mayor Rowe, of Portland, and taken aboard the O. R. & N. steamer Bailey Gatzert, being at the same time extended the freedom of Portland. From The Dalles the trip down the river will be made by boat.

In addition to the 250 delegates traveling on the big special train, there are about 150 who preferred to come West on the regular trains.

The two weeks' convention of the grand lodges of A. O. U. W. and the Degree of Honor, will be begun by a short business session this afternoon and an informal reception in the evening.

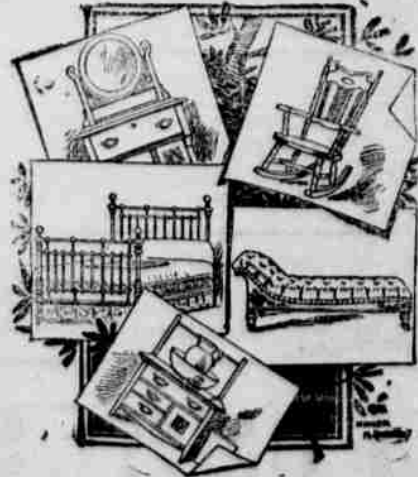
