THAT FRANCHISE

MELLMANN-ROMO APPLICATION BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Matter Referred to Street Committee—Ordinance to Regulate Chickens Discussed and Several Bills Paid.

The city dads met Wednesday night in regular session and transacted city business which had not been touched for several weeks. All the councilmen were present except T. B. Wells.

The application of Mellmann and Romo, of electric railway fame, for a franchise to build and conduct an electric road on our streets, was referred to the street committee without any definite action.

The city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance to be considered at the next meeting for the regulation of chickens in the city limits. A great deal of complaint has been made recently about chickens running at large and the council has concluded to follow in the wake of other cities and pass an ordinance forbidding owners of fowls from letting them run at large at certain times of the season.

Bids of the Thompson Hardware Company and the Boston Hose & Rubber Company for supplying the fire department with 1600 feet of new hose, were investigated and the fire committee authorized to purchase 800 feet from each company. This is to be paid for after the hose is tested and all faulty lengths replaced.

The report of A. R. Holmes, who experted the city's books, was presented and everything was found to be correct.

The matter of extending the Court street sewer to drain into the Walters mill race, was referred to a committee consisting of Mayor Halley, Councilmen Clopton and Johnson.

The fire committee was authorized to purchase an additional hose cart for the city and to place the old fire engine with Temple & Wilcox, authorizing them to dispose of it at \$1500. This engine is not used since the water pressure was put in and is therefore, a drug on the town.

Liquor licenses were granted to Antone Nolte, Foster & McIntyre, Monteith & Howard and F. J. Bacon. The actions of the recorder and mayor in drawing warrants for fixed salaries and of Councilmen Hartman and Clopton in making a loan of \$2,000 to Mossie & Sons out of the sinking fund, were ratified.
