EVERETT WILL PLAY

HERE TWO DAYS.

Heavy Hitters From the Coast Will Do Battle With the Indians Tomorrow and Sunday.

The heavy Everett baseball team will arrive in the city this evening and play against the Indians at Alta street grounds tomorrow. This team is considered the strongest which the Indians have yet gone against, and it will be a case of "play ball" from start to finish if they deliver the goods and land the scalps of the husky visitors.

Everett beat Walla Walla yesterday and has administered more or less severe drubbings to nearly all the crack teams of the Northwest. The Redskins, however, succeeded in beating Everett one game while on their tour of the coast recently, and Captain Ziegler feels confident that his boys will make the play go double the same way here.

Tomorrow "Bob" Wilner will be in the box for the Indians and if he puts up the same kind of a game he pitched against Dayton he will come off the diamond with flying colors and the Everett scalplock tightly within his grasp.
