### WALLA WALLA NEWS.

What Is Doing in the State Line Town.

Walla Walla, June 14.—The funeral of Mrs. Edward Mangan occurred this morning at 8:30 o'clock from the Catholic church. Rev. Father Flohr officiating. Mrs. Mangan was an aged lady and was well known here. Recently her mind gave way and a few days ago she was committed to the asylum for insane at Medical Lake. Shortly afterwards she suddenly grew weaker and expired. The body arrived yesterday from the asylum.

The high school cadets left the city this morning for a camping trip up the river, intending to make camp at Thomas cabins, 25 miles above the city. The lads will have military training during their stay in the hills.

Complaint is made by farmers in the Dixie neighborhood, several miles above the city, that rust has attacked wheat fields and considerable damage is feared.
