CAMPMEETING AT MILTON.

Members of Christian Church are Gathered There.

Milton, June 12.—Several hundred members of the Christian church, a majority of whom are encamped in Nichols Grove, here, attend regularly the camp meetings which are being conducted by several prominent Christian church ministers. Among the leaders are E. C. Sanderson, of the Eugene Divinity school, who conducts a Bible institute every morning and gives lectures on a trip through Palestine, from which he returned not long ago. Also J. T. Eshelman of Tacoma, state evangelist for Washington.

The Walla Walla district, embraced in the campmeeting, comprises the counties of southeastern Washington south of Snake river; a small portion of Idaho and some of Eastern Oregon. The outsiders are encamped here in numerous tents, the mode of living during the two weeks of the service being similar to that of the Seventh Day Adventists. A little town of tents has been reared in Nichols Grove, the tents appropriately furnished and board obtained either down town or at a restaurant which has been placed at the Grove. Some of the outsiders board themselves in their tents. As the restaurant meals are provided at the current rate of 25 cents per, and tents are rented at any price from \$2.25 down for the meetings. The camp was formed June 5, and will break up June 15.

There is no lack of services among the Christians during camp meeting; if the program of the present series is any criterion. Those who attend faithfully during the entire 10 days will have heard 23 sermons, 23 special addresses, about 15 song services and numerous devotional services, prayer meetings and special meetings for young people. In addition discussions are interpolated after each paper read, and the general affairs of the church discussed. There is no time for play in Nichols Grove. Every one is supposed to worship. Sometimes camp meeting begins at 6 a. m., with a sunrise prayer meeting, only ending after 15 hours constant services with meal intermissions.

She Was a Fake.

Mrs. Kate E. Padfield, the woman who, with several small children, was traveling through this section a couple of weeks ago and telling a story to the effect that she was on the way with her tribe to join an aunt in California, but had been destitute when she started from her home in Missouri and was trusting to the authorities for assistance in reaching her destination, has appeared in Ashland, Or. There, as at other points in the state, she received sufficient monetary aid to take her well on her way. It is now evident that she was a traveling fakir, as she is known to have received several times the amount necessary to take her to her alleged destination.

Bridge Contracts Let.

The O. R. & N. C., Thursday, let a contract to the Pacific Coast Construction Company, of which J. H. Smith is president, for improvements that will cost about \$25,000. These will include the filling of 18 or 20 trestle bridges on the lines east of Umatilla, in both Oregon and Washington, involving the moving of about 100,000 cubic yards of dirt, changing river channels and other similar work for the betterment of the track. The contract will be taken up at once, and will be completed before fall.

H. T. Thiebault Fined.

H. T. Thiebault, who was brought from Umatilla the first of the week, charged with the theft of an overcoat, was taken before the court this forenoon and allowed to plead guilty to the charge of petit larceny. He is only a boy and owing to the fact that he is apparently not a criminal by nature, the penalty was made only a fine of \$20. An attempt will be made to secure the young man a place to work and see if he will not straighten up, instead of making a criminal out of him by sending him to the penitentiary for a few months.

NO RUST IN UMATILLA

DREADED WHEAT DISEASE HAS NOT APPEARED HERE.

If Any Wheat Fields of This County Are Affected the Farmers Have Not Yet Discovered the Fact.

The Walla Walla Union of recent date contained an item to the effect that rust had appeared in the wheat fields of the Walla Walla valley.

This is a disease which attacks growing grain and is caused by too much rain and sudden hot weather, after the grain has grown rank. It generally attacks the thickest spots although when it gets a foothold in a field it does more or less damage to all.

After interviewing many farmers from different parts of Umatilla county, the East Oregonian finds that no rust has appeared in the county, or at least, if it has no one has discovered the fact.

Rust is one of the most dreaded diseases to the farmer, as when it attacks a spot in a wheat field it simply dries it up and the grain does not amount to anything. It forms on the leaves of the grain first in the shape of a sediment and closely resembles rust on iron. If the rust gets hold of the grain early in the season it attacks the stalk before the grain ripens and when it gets this far there is no use harvesting it at all for all the kernel.

Rust is almost a stranger in Oregon, although it has made its appearance in a few places for the past several years, but has never got such a foothold as to be much of a bugaboo to the wheat raiser. In the east it is nothing unusual to see whole fields of many acres of fine looking wheat eaten up by the disease until it was abandoned and left for the stock to devour in the fall.
