INDIANS TOOK TWO

BEAT EVERETT BOTH SATURDAY AND SUNDAY

Took the Saturday Game By a Score of 14 to 2 and Won Out on Sunday With a Light Score of 2 to 1.

Two straight games did the ferocious Pendleton Indians defeat their husky antagonists from the forest wilds of Everett, and the lads from the city of nails and shingles were beaten in such a manner as to leave no doubt as to which was the superior team.

On Saturday the score stood 14 to 2 in favor of the redskins while the Sunday game was more even, the score being 2 to 1. Both games were good exhibitions of ball playing, the visitors being unfortunate at critical periods on Saturday, and letting the winning run come in by a wild throw in the last of the ninth on Sunday.

The result would not have been different had the wild throw been made as Pendleton had the bases full and only one cut with three strong batters coming to bat in succession when the error was made that let an Indian slide over the home plate and end the game.

Saturday's game was a fireworks exhibition from the start and after the second inning the Indians had such a start that the visitors became discouraged and gave up all hope of winning out. Toward the last of the game both sides played slack ball.

On Sunday the game was different. For five straight innings a double row of goose-eggs decorated the score board. In the sixth both made one run. In the seventh and eighth neither scored, but in the last half of the ninth a wild throw by the Everetts let in the winning run. The bases were full at the time and a run was certain to be scored anyway so the fans were decidedly sorry to see the game won through an error.

The umpiring in both games, judged seen here in some time and gaped as a whole, was the best which has been seen here in some time and gave general satisfaction. Of course, there were a few bad decisions, but these are bound to happen in every game of baseball which is played. No umpire ever satisfied both the teams and the crowd.

PEOPLES WAREHOUSE

IN DISTRICT COURT. Busy Times at the Court Room Last Week.

District court convened again this morning after resting over Sunday. The case on today is that of C. F. Drake vs. the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, and J. F. Kaufman and is for damages in the sum of \$22,000 for false imprisonment and malicious prosecution. This case has taken all of today and may string out into tomorrow.

The cases disposed of last week were:

In the case of J. M. Walker vs. the Northwestern Warehouse Company, the jury found a verdict for Mr. Walker, giving him judgment against the company for \$1586.29. It may be appealed.

The jury in the case of Joseph Dupuis vs. W. S. Byers, found a verdict for \$500 in favor of plaintiff. This was a suit for \$1200 damages resulting from the change of W. S. Byers' mill race and running it near Mr. Dupuis' house. This may also be appealed.

Peter West got a verdict against him for \$1 in his case against Ed Muir to collect money alleged due for rent.

In the case of Frank Roach vs. John Muir the jury's verdict which was returned this morning, gave Roach judgment for \$1. This was a case to collect rent.

The six cases against J. L. Bisher were all settled and dismissed. These were to collect bills claimed to be owed by Bisher.

The case of Millarkey against Huson, was settled and dismissed; the suit of Clark & Johnson against J. F. Raymond was dismissed on motion of plaintiff. In the Dowd Brothers Lumber Company vs. A. M. Gillis the demurrer was overruled. C. W. Hollis vs. William Krebs was dismissed. The town of Milton vs. L. L. Berry was dismissed; R. E. Porter vs. John Anderson, settled and dismissed; John Fry vs. Charles Cunningham, demurrer, overruled; J. H. Wilson vs. G. J. Bowman, settled and dismissed; W. S. Byers vs. J. I. Froome, and Huson vs. Parris, were continued for the term.
