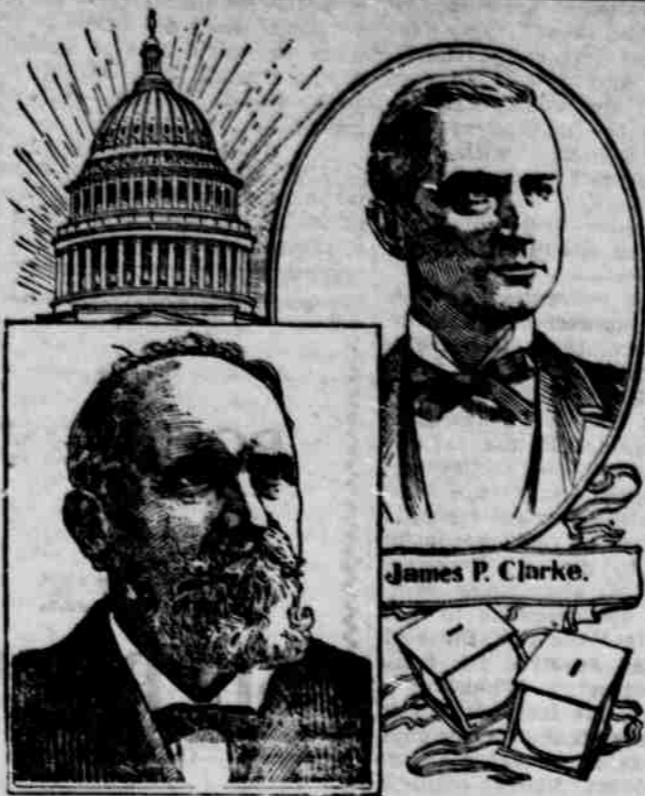

W. M. PIERCE TALKS

INTERVIEWED BY A BAKER CITY NEWSPAPERMAN

Makes Himself Interesting on Subjects of the Late Campaign and Politics; Some of the Measures he Will Support as Senator.

One of the few democratic senators who will be in the next legislature, a body the great majority of which was elected for the purpose of sending a republican to the United States senate, was in Baker City Friday, says the Democrat. This was Hon. Walter M. Pierce, of Umatilla county. Mr. Pierce was elected from the district composed of Umatilla, Union and Morrow counties, a district with a nominal republican majority of 1000. In fact, at the last election the republicans lacked only 11 votes of having a majority of 1000. Mr. Pierce's plurality in this election was 256. When it is remembered that Mr. Pierce lost the Umatilla questionable democratic vote of 300 and the Union county Scriber vote of 200, it will be seen how many republicans voted for him. Taking this into consideration and also the fact that all the democrats who were elected succeeded in a measure through the friendship of the republicans, Mr. Pierce hopes that the much needed legislation that will come before the legislature will not become entangled in partisan politics.

Mr. Pierce said that he owed his election to the statements he made on the stump concerning the legislation he proposed to work for next winter, as well as to the very efficient organization the democrats had in the three counties of his district.

In Morrow county the campaign was managed by Hon. J. W. Morrow; in Umatilla county A. D. Stillman directed matters, which revolutionized Umatilla county politics, and in Union, Turner Oliver was the commander, who made a majority that surprised everybody in the state. These three men more than any other three elected George E. Chamberlain, without speaking disparagingly of the highly able and efficient work that was done by Chairman White and the state committee.

Mr. Pierce said yesterday that one of the measures he proposed to work for will be tax all classes of insurance companies for the benefit of the school fund. Mr. Pierce desires to add all the other branches except, of course, fraternal and co-operative insurance.

He says he will work hard for a bill to place all state officers on a flat salary and turn all fees into the state treasury.

Another thing Mr. Pierce is interested in is a revision of the incorporation laws in this state, which are old fashioned and obsolete. He would have it so that all companies with their home offices in Oregon shall be incorporated in this state. At present all the biggest and richest companies go to New Jersey, West Virginia and other states. For instance, the Red Boy is incorporated in West Virginia, the Golconda in Arizona. Thus many hundreds of dollars are lost in fees that really belong at home.

Mr. Pierce says that many minor laws need revision. The little defects are especially noticeable to lawyers, such as the laws on marks and brands, court pleadings, etc.

A special pet measure of Mr. Pierce is to have a law passed to assess real estate only once in three years and have the assessor in the other two years assess only personal property and improvements. In some states real estate is assessed only once in five or ten years and a big saving is effected in the matter of fees and clerical hire. This lawmaker also thinks it

would be better to pay taxes in the fall instead of in the spring, as he is of the belief that the added penalty for procrastination in payment, which now amounts to practically 27 per cent., is too heavy and often works a hardship on men of small means, while wealthy people are not affected.

Mr. Pierce has up his sleeve an idea concerning abstracts. It is to have a bill passed to compel all makers of abstracts to give a continuous bond that all abstracts made by them are correct.

He believes none of these measures will have to do with politics, and he hopes to receive the co-operation of enough republicans to make laws of these ideas.

DESTINY OF FINE BUILDINGS.

What Becomes of Exposition Buildings When Fairs are Ended.

Exposition visitors often wonder what becomes of the fine Exposition buildings. That their days of usefulness are not always ended with the Exposition is shown by the fact that the "Victoria House," the British government building at the World's Columbian Exposition, Chicago is still in existence. It is in Kansas City in a "knocked-down" condition, wrapped in cotton batting and burlap, and the Manufacturers' Club of that thriving Western Missouri city is negotiating for the purchase of it to serve as a club house. The structure is 70x120 feet, and two and one-half stories high. It is a magnificent structure of brick and stone, all finished with hand carved English oak, and is all in its original fine condition. When this building is erected in Kansas City that city will have two of the Columbian Exposition buildings within her limits, the other being the beautiful Wisconsin state building which is the home of the Kansas City Elks Lodge and Club, and said to be the finest Elks club house in the country.

Religious Exhibit.

Rev. Samuel I. Lindsay, secretary of the World's Fair Religious Building and Exhibit committee, has written President Francis of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, conveying to that officer the thanks of the committee for the kind consideration he has already shown their request for the erection of a building of sufficient capacity and of suitable architectural design to accommodate the vast exhibit contemplated. There will be no difficulty, Dr. Lindsay says, in securing the united operation of all the religious bodies involved for making an exhibit worthy of the World's Fair and the cause of religion. The plans of the Religious Committee have been unanimously endorsed by each general religious body before which it has been laid.

Team to Milk Wagon Runaway.

Cheney Bros. milk wagon team ran away on Main street Saturday evening and for a few minutes made things lively in their path. Lemuel Cheney was making the evening deliveries and stopped the team in front of George Demott's grocery store, leaving it for a few moments. The Salvation Army corps came along and formed a circle near the team, getting ready for the evening street meeting. This frightened the team and they started to run, going down Main street to the corner of Webb, where they turned east. The wagon hung up on a telegraph pole at the corner and the team broke loose and left the wagon hanging. Little damage was done, other than the breaking of the doubletrees to the wagon.
