They were married in Pendleton 10 years ago and lived together until 1898, when defendant was convicted in the superior court of Walla Walla county for perjury and served three years in the penitentiary. After being discharged he refused to live with plaintiff and now she asks the court to set her free. There are no children. J. T. Hinkle is plaintiff's attorney.

A FOOLISH OLD MAN.

He incenses the People of the East. End of Town and Is Arrested. Charles Hinds is now languishing in the county jail with the charge of indecent exposure against him. Last week complaint was registered with the chief of police by the residents of the east end of town against a man going around and finding a group of children at play, would partly undress himself and make all kinds of propositions to the children, offering them money. The police could not locate the man for a day or two, but Saturday he was found and arrested by Policeman Fee. He was placed in jail and has announced that he would plead guilty to the charge. He will be held for trial during the present term of the district court. Hinds is a man of about 50 years of age, is a transient and it is said has been guilty of similar offenses in Portland.

TRAGEDY IN HARNEY.

Jerry Daley and Robert Quarrrel and Shoot, the Latter Killed.

Jerry Daley shot and killed a man named Robert Quarrrel, on the Burns Vista ranch, Harney county, Sunday of last week. The ranch is 18 miles south of Burns and that town is 180 miles from the railroad. The men quarreled while on the range and both drew their guns; Daley shot and killed Robert Quarrrel from behind his horse before the latter could slide from his saddle. Daley gave him a lift up and is in jail at Burns. The deceased leaves a wife and two children, residing in California. Jerry Daley, who is about 25 years old, is well known in Grant county, having been employed until the first of May, driving stage for C. M. Kellogg on the Canyon-Burns route. He has two brothers, Fatsy and Paddy Daley, residing near Prairie City, and a brother, John Daley, living at Drew.

ROY CASEY IN JAIL.

He Made an Attack Upon Rex Jarrett With a Deadly Weapon.

Roy Casey is in the county jail, charged with assault with a deadly weapon on Rex Jarrett Sunday afternoon. Casey and Jarrett got into a dispute over the fight earlier in the day between Thomas Scott and A. Gasaway and Casey struck Jarrett. They were parted and Casey got hold of a stone, tied it in the corner of his handkerchief, went back and renewed the fight in front of the State saloon, on Main street. He struck Jarrett with this stone, but did not get a fair lick at him. They were parted by the bystanders and the weapon taken from him. About that time Policeman Fee arrived and when he arrested Casey he had an open knife up his sleeve and was evidently going to use it on Jarrett. Casey was taken before Justice Fitz Gerald this afternoon and bound over in the sum of \$150. In default he went to jail.

NORTHWEST TOURNAMENT.

Those From Pendleton Who Will Probably Participate in It.

The local sportsmen spent most of the day Sunday, on the hill south of town, practicing with their shotguns at blue rocks and getting themselves in trim for the Northwest shooting tournament, which is to come off in Portland, beginning Wednesday. The local boys did some fine practice work Sunday and they are going to Portland Tuesday night confident of having a good time, if they do not carry off all the prizes. While it is not yet definitely settled who will go, the following have said they were going, if it were possible: A. D. and H. J. Stillman, Fred Walte, James Spence, D. C. Clark, Will Ingram, A. B. Thompson and James Means. Several others have designated a desire to attend the tournament, but have not yet decided definitely.

Killed a Bald-Face Bear.

J. W. Ray and J. E. Corley are in town from Gurdane. Mr. Ray said that A. Banks, a neighbor of his, killed a yearling bald-face bear in the timber near Gurdane a few days ago. He was out with a 22 rifle shooting squirrels and was accompanied by his dog. While in the brush the dog ran across the bear and forced him to climb a tree. The hunters then shot him in the neck with his little squirrel gun, but this did not seem to effect his bearship and Mr. Banks went home and armed himself with a heavier gun, went back to where the dog had the bear up the tree and proceeded to dispatch him.

Did Not Disturb Meeting.

Albert Neil, of Colfax, and Albert Hamilton, were arrested in the Salvation Army hall, Saturday evening, by Policeman Scheer, at the instigation of Captain Kuhn, for disturbing the meetings. They were kept in jail until this morning, when they were taken before Police Judge McCourt and discharged. Several witnesses were examined and the evidence went to show that neither of the men charged were as much to blame for the disturbance as another who was not arrested at all. Judge McCourt lectured the captain of the army for causing the arrest of the men without ample evidence to convict.
