A RAILROAD MAN INSANE

GENERAL FREIGHT AGENT OF THE MISSOURI PACIFIC

His Mind Suddenly Collapses While He is Passing Through the Willamette Valley; in Custody at Eugene.

The Eugene Guard of Saturday says E. J. Flynn general freight agent of the Missouri Pacific railway, arrived here this morning at 3 o'clock on the northbound train in an insane condition and was turned over by the trainmen to the night police who awakened Sheriff Withers and that individual took charge of him and placed him in the county jail.

Flynn boarded the train at Cottage Grove. It is said that he acted very strangely there, giving away his gold watch and all the money he had, and wanted to give away his fine diamond ring, but was restrained from doing so.

As an evidence of his insanity, Flynn wrote the following telegram at the depot last night and wanted it sent:

Albany, June 20, 1902.—To Oregonian, City—Have been delegated through the great spirit of our lord to advise our beloved President Roosevelt on matters now in controversy between both senate and house of representatives. Please arrange to meet me on arrival.

E. J. FLYNN. The case was brought before County Judge H. R. Kincaid, on Saturday. Papers on the unfortunate man's person identified him as the general freight agent of the entire Missouri Pacific railway system. The man had annual passes on nearly every railroad in the United States. Considering him to be a man of some importance in railroad circles, Judge Kincaid sent a telegram to George J. Coman, president of the Missouri Pacific system at New York, telling of the unfortunate man's condition. A similar telegram was sent to W. E. Coman, general freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, at Portland. The following reply was received:

Portland, Ore. June 20, 1902. H. R. Kincaid, County Judge, Eugene, Ore.—Your wire concerning Mr. Flynn. Representatives from Rio Grand will go to Eugene tonight to care for him.
