BETTER SCHOOLS

THE BUILDING FUND OF THE PENDLETON ACADEMY.

Total of the Fund to Date, \$13,723, and the Amount Wanted is Fully \$20,000—Can't You Help to Get It and Share in the Benefits of Better Schools?

An effort is to be made to complete the fund for the new Pendleton Academy building to be erected on the north side of the Umatilla, just east of the old city cemetery, the most sately location in Pendleton, and one fully as convenient for the children to attend the school as any.

Those who have not subscribed to the fund should do so at once, as work on the building must begin in the next few weeks, or it cannot be completed this season, before winter, as is greatly desired.

The Pendleton Academy has done good work in Pendleton and shown its worth as a school. In the future it will do still better work, as its faculty will be stronger in several ways and the school better equipped.

It is desired to raise at least \$20,000 for a new building, including the \$4000 which probably can be obtained for the present buildings and six lots on which they stand in East Pendleton. Recently there has been subscribed to the fund \$5000 by the Presbyterian Board of Aid in Chicago, and \$1000 by William M. Jadd, the Portland banker, who takes a decided interest in Pendleton and the effort to build up a good academic private school here, and Mr. Ladd has no property interests in Pendleton to enhance in value.

There is not a citizen, property-owner or taxpayer in Pendleton and vicinity who cannot afford to give liberally to this fund.

First, because a good private school will have influence in making the public schools better.

Second, it will add to Pendleton's and Umatilla county's school resources.

Third, it will provide education that would have to be obtained by sending children away from home, thereby saving parents a great deal of money.

Fourth, it will add to Pendleton's equipment as a business town, supplying one more "industry" that brings trade to Pendleton.

Fifth, it will make a better Pendleton.

Sixth, the conduct of the school will save to the general taxpayers of public school district No. 16 from \$4000 to \$6000 a year, that would have to be spent additionally upon the public schools of the district out of the public purse in educating the children who attend Pendleton Academy that is not a public burden, but maintained by individual effort and the receipts from tuition.

Manager Osburn, of the Athena team, is in the city today but it is not yet known whether he will arrange for the long-projected and much wished for series of three games for the purpose of settling the supremacy between the Yellow Kids and the Indians.

The Pendleton boys stand ready at any time to play three games on neutral grounds with an impartial umpire for any sum from \$500 to \$1000 a side the winner of two games to take the entire amount, and some enthusiastic fans are now declaring that Athena can get a bonus of \$1000 for the man who will rub up the sports of that place to put up their end of a bet of \$1000 a side for the series.

BACK FROM JOHN DAY.

Joseph Hoch Talks of His Trip Through That Section.

Joseph Hoch has returned from a recent trip into the John Day country, where he went to look after his stock and land interests. Mr. Hoch says he never saw range better in the John Day country and that stock is looking fine.

A great many cattle are being sold now, the spring sales from the range just beginning a few days ago. The price is ranging from \$3.85 for steers to \$3.25 for cows.

He also stated that some grain was burning in different parts of the country, especially west and southwest of Pendleton, "but this is nothing new," said Mr. Hoch, "as the grain in this part of the country where the soil is so light, always burns. To take it on a whole, prospects are better than last year."

Try, Try, Again.

A new suit was inaugurated this forenoon by J. C. Saltmarsh against the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, a corporation, to recover judgment against defendants for \$30,000 injuries to himself and \$117 injuries to wagon and team, in a collision with a freight train, at the crossing of Chestnut street, in 1900. This is the second action brought against the railroad company for the same thing, the first being tried in the present term of court and a verdict rendered against the plaintiff. T. G. Halley and John McCourt are attorneys for the plaintiff.

A. Bleggen, a 16-year-old boy at Cheney, Wash., shot himself through the head with a revolver on Saturday last, dying before becoming conscious. It was a clear case of suicide. No reason assigned.
