### GENERAL NEWS.

A cash donation of \$50,000 to be used in carrying on the strike in the West Virginia coal fields, was received at the national headquarters of the United Mine Workers in Indianapolis. It came from the Illinois miners.

J. F. Collins, who was under arrest for the murder of J. H. Faught, at Jennings, Mont., a short time ago, broke jail at KallsPELL, Wednesday afternoon and has not yet been recaptured. He is in the mountains and a posse in pursuit.

The ministry of agriculture estimates the Hungarian wheat yield at 24,800,000 metric hundred weight, or 16,000,000 less than the previous estimate. The ministry estimates that the yield of rye, barley and oats will not vary much from the previous estimate.

William Riggs, a leading Idaho horsedealer, Wednesday shipped from Weiser five carloads of horses to eastern markets. He will pick up cars along the line between that city and Pocatello that are being loaded for him at other points. When he leaves Pocatello he will have 19 cars.

In a dispatch from Pekin the correspondent there of the London Daily Mail says he hears upon the highest authority that in the recent mining and railways concessions agreement with Russia, a clause exists under which China virtually renounces all claims to sovereignty in Manchuria.

Walter S. Cox, former associate justice of the supreme court in the District of Columbia, and one of the most distinguished jurists in the country, died in Washington Wednesday, aged 76 years. Judge Cox presided over many famous criminal cases, the most notable of which was the trial of Guiteau, for the assassination of President Garfield.

The Home Investment Company, of Boise, Idaho, has been awarded the issue of \$25,000 of city improvement bonds of Boise, its bid being par and \$1087.59 premium. The bonds draw 4 per cent interest, run for 20 years and provide \$12,500 for a new central fire station, \$8500 for a rock crusher and leveler and a fund for street improvements, also \$4000 to purchase a site for a public library building.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Dr. James Minty, a noted character and for many years stock inspector of Yamhill county, died at McMinnville Wednesday morning, aged 71 years. He is survived by five children.

Voting for a Goddess of Liberty for the Fourth of July celebration at Astoria, ended Wednesday evening, and resulted in the election of Miss Mollie Eater. The contest was quite spirited, several thousand votes being cast.

The Willamette river has fallen to such a low stage that it will be impossible for the boats to go further up the river than Independence. Saturday evening the Pomona stuck on the Santiam bar, and it was 5:30 o'clock Sunday morning before the boat was able to run into Corvallis.

Among the students who were given degrees at the annual commencement of Yale University Wednesday afternoon were: Joseph Adams Hill, degree of bachelor of science, and Frank Joseph Sladen, degree of bachelor of art. Both men are from Portland, Or.

Governor Geer Wednesday pardoned from the penitentiary Frank Shinn, who was serving a five-year sentence for larceny. Shinn was sent up from Baker county in March, 1901, and his pardon was granted upon the showing of the prosecuting witness, who states there is some doubt as to the connection of Shinn with the crime.

#### NEW TRIAL DENIED.

Tharp, Convicted of Horsestealing, Will Be Sentenced.

Judge W. R. Ellis has denied a new trial for John Tharp, convicted by a jury of 12 citizens for horsestealing. The attorneys for Tharp moved for a new trial immediately after the verdict of guilty was read to the court and was given until Thursday afternoon in which to file the motion. Judge Ellis set 3 o'clock p. m. for the argument for the new trial and after a prolonged argument he positively denied the prisoner the right to a new trial, believing the evidence as brought out before the jury and its action after due deliberation, to be justified. Tharp's attorneys contend that he is not guilty and did not have a fair trial, but the judge and prosecuting attorney believed otherwise and this afternoon, at 4 o'clock, Tharp will be sentenced to serve a term in the penitentiary.

This is the second time he has been found guilty of the same charge in Umatilla county. He served five years in the state's prison several years ago for horse-stealing.

### JUST IN TIME.

Ben Walden Saves a Drowning Child With a Salmon Hook.

Walter Sams, the 4-year-old son of Charles Sams, residing on Dry creek, near Weston, escaped a watery grave by a narrow margin, last Monday, says the Leader.

The boy's parents have been absent at intervals for two or three weeks, leaving Walter and his 10-year-old sister alone at the house. As their nearest neighbor, Ben Walden, lives 300 yards away, the children were thus left practically without the protection of "grown ups" by their somewhat inconsiderate parents.

Near the house is a well about 20 feet deep, containing seven feet of water. Walter had gone to the well to draw himself a drink, and fell in. His sister saw him disappear, and ran frightened and screaming to the Walden home. "Walter is in the well!" she screamed.

It luckily happened that Mr. Walden was at home, else the truant parents would have found a drowned boy upon their return. He sprinted the 300 yards at top speed, and secured a salmon hook with a long pole attached, with which he fished out the youngster, catching the hook in his waistband. Ben says he never landed a fish with as much lively satisfaction as he lifted that drowning boy out of the well.

In going down the boy clutched desperately at the pulley rope. This
