TWO YEARS OR \$1000.

That is the Sentence Imposed on John Tharp, Convicted Horse-stealer.

"It is the judgment of this court that you be incarcerated in the Oregon state prison for a term of two years," said Judge W. R. Ellis in addressing John Tharp Friday evening.

Tharp was found guilty by a jury last Wednesday on the charge of horse-stealing, and a motion for a new trial was made by his attorney, J. H. Raley, but this was denied and Tharp sentenced.

After passing the sentence, Judge Ellis conferred with District Attorney Hailey and they concluded that in case Tharp could pay a fine of \$1000 the sentence of two years in state's prison would be commuted and the sentence changed to the fine.

The judge said, in making this change, that he would not, under any consideration, make the sentence strictly a fine, for in case Tharp wanted to lay out the fine in jail rather than pay it, there would be a big expense to the county, but if he can raise the fine he will be liberated.

Mr. Tharp was asked today what he was going to do in regard to going to the penitentiary or paying the \$1000 fine. He said he had not made up his mind what would be done, but the case would be appealed. He said he had not paid the fine, but District Attorney Hailey says the \$1000 in the hands of the county clerk as Tharp's bond, has been turned over to the county treasurer to apply on the fine. Tharp gave the attorney this privilege late Friday evening, saying he would get the other \$200 today.
