ON THE GLORIOUS FOURTH

But the fun came in when the prizes were awarded. J. T. Hinkle was the man who this honor fell to and he did his work in apple pie order. All of the prizes were toys. Those entering the contest were led to believe they were going to receive some really valuable article and each nerve was strained to win.

When the dapple gray horse was picked out of a box and handed to young Turner he almost fainted. The bedroom suite, and likewise the sewing machine, were toys and were actually worth nothing. All the contestants, however, took the joke in good spirit.

The Dance.

While the dancing continued all the afternoon it did not assume very great proportions until after dark, when the large platform was crowded to its utmost. The music was good and the dancing was lively and well enjoyed. It lasted until after midnight. Everything was carried on in a quiet, orderly manner.
