MANY HEAD HAVE BEEN SHOT IN GRANT COUNTY.

Cattle Men Are Determined to Keep and Even Threaten to Kill the

For the past several years trouble has been brewing between the cattle and sheep men of the interior. Only within two years past, however, has this trouble amounted to an open outbreak, and last year was the first real serious trouble that has developed between the two factions.

The greatest kick has been against outside stock, especially sheep, invading the range. Now it is announced by a circular sent out by the sheep and cattle men of Grant county, that Monday. July 7, has been set for the purpose of getting men together and have a meeting to ing the ranges.

Several times last year the bitter feeling of the interior stock men against outside invasion broke out and several shooting scrapes were the result. Many head of cattle and sheep were killed, but last winter it was argued that all of this trouble had been settled and there would be no more bloodshed. This has not proven true. Only a few weeks ago a band of sheep were fired into at Bear Valley, Grant county, and 200 were said to have been slain. These were from a band being driven into Grant county, and although, having been warned several times, the herders paid no attention and the shooting was the result.

Feeling Very Intense.

According to advices from the interior the feeling is very intense in the vicinity of the shooting over outside sheepmen trespassing on the cattle range and the cattle men seem to be determined to put a stop to it if possible. They go far enough to assert that they will kill every head of sheep driven into the country and, if necessary, before the outside stock men will recognize the home men's rights, they will kill a few herders.

A dead line has been established, but the herders have made no effort to keep their flocks outside of the bounds and as a result, it is claimed that the holdings of many settlers have been eaten off and in some instances crops have been broken into in the absence of the owner and destroyed by the sheep. This has brought the settlers up in arms and the result may be serious. In another shooting scrape which occurred a few days after the one mentioned above, it is said 150 ewes belonging to William Mascall, a sheep man of the South Fork, were killed. This shooting occurred near the head of Rock Creek. The men doing the shooting held up the herders, took

their arms from them and burned up the camp supplies. Different Opinions,

Many different opinions exist among the stockmen as to the right of the range. Some contend that outside sheep men have no right to the range which justly belongs to the stock men of Grant county, while others claim that the public domain Sheep Herders Off Their Range, belongs to one man as much as to another and, being free to all, should be used by the outsider if he wants it as much as by the man at home, who pays his taxes into the treasury of Grant county and helps to pay the running expenses of the county. 


