ARE KILLING SHEEP

MANY HEAD HAVE BEEN SHOT IN GRANT COUNTY.

Cattle Men Are Determined to Keep Sheep Herders Off Their Range, and Even Threaten to Kill the Herders.

For the past several years trouble has been brewing between the cattle and sheep men of the interior. Only within two years past, however, has this trouble amounted to an open outbreak, and last year was the first serious trouble that has developed between the two factions.

The greatest kick has been against outside stock, especially sheep, invading the range. Now it is announced by a circular sent out by the sheep and cattle men of Grant county, that Monday, July 7, has been set for the purpose of getting all the local representative stock men together and have a meeting to try and settle the local difficulties and arrange some amicable means for settling their troubles and dividing the ranges.

Both sheep and cattle men are reported to be electing delegates to represent them in the meeting which is to be held at Canyon City. This meeting is principally for the purpose of dividing the range between the sheep men and cattle owners of Grant county and no provision will be made for the outsider. If it is a success and things are arranged am-

their arms from them and burned up the camp supplies.

Different Opinions.

Many different opinions exist among the stockmen as to the right of the range. Some contend that outside sheep men have no right to the range which justly belongs to the stock men of Grant county, while others claim that the public domain belongs to one man as much as to another and, being free to all, should be used by the outsider if he wants it as much as by the man at home, who pays his taxes into the treasury of Grant county and helps to pay the running expenses of the county. As long as the stock man keeps his stock off the private owning of the individual he is at home anywhere on government land.

Thinks Situation Serious.

In speaking of the recent outbreak, the Grant County News says: "It is certain that something must be done soon, as the feeling is growing more intense each season, and more serious trouble is looked for as the feeling of vengeance increases. Although no lives have been reported lost as yet, still loss of life may occur any day. So long as parties on both sides are determined, as they appear to be, something is going to drop."
