#### GENERAL NEWS.

William Clark, head of the firm manufacturing the famous Clark's thread, used all over the American continent, died Monday in England.

The opinion is expressed by authorities on the subject that within a few years Alaska's agricultural products will surpass her mineral output in value.

The statement of British imports and exports for June, just issued by the London Board of Trade, shows a decrease of \$1,045,700 in imports, and \$1,192,000 in exports.

Orders have been given by Secretary Moody to have one of the four new battleships authorized by the recent congress, constructed at the New York navy yard.

The Western Union Telegraph Company has been notified to vacate its offices on the line of the Pennsylvania railway, the road having made a contract with the Postal Telegraph Company.

Of the silks used in the United States, \$26,000,000 worth are imported and \$107,000,000 home-made. The domestic silk industry employs 24,000 men, 36,000 women and 6000 children in 483 mills, with \$81,000,000 capital.

W. M. Fine, first guard at the Oregon state penitentiary, has resigned to accept a more lucrative position.

J. O. Ziegler, of La Grande, is critically ill at St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, where he recently underwent an operation for appendicitis.

Rev. H. B. Kimball, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, Syracuse, Ill., has accepted a call to the First Methodist Episcopal church of Spokane.

The comptroller of the currency, Monday designated the Merchants' National Bank, of Portland, as reserve agent of the First National Bank at Burns, Or.

Tom Montgomery, a merchant of Etopia, started from that place to Pasco some days since with \$200 in his pocket, and has not since been seen. Foul play is feared.

The Red, White and Blue line, at Malheur City, has been sold to an eastern syndicate and its owner, Mrs. Mary Richardson, has been enriched by several thousands of dollars.

During a dance at the Thompson place, 11 miles from Prineville, John Getz and John Cunningham engaged in an altercation in which the latter drew a knife and stabbed Getz several times, inflicting wounds from which he may die. Getz is said to have been the bully of the county, while Cunningham was a peaceable man.

#### ALFALFA FOR FEED.

Island in Columbia River Devoted to its Cultivation.

E. W. McComas, who leased Switzer's Island, in the Columbia river, between Wallula and Umatilla, says he has 200 acres of alfalfa sown last spring, which is looking first rate and is growing right along, without any irrigation.

In addition to the alfalfa, he has 200 acres in beardless barley which will soon be ready to harvest, and 15 acres in potatoes. Mr. McComas says his steam irrigation plant worked to perfection this spring and he irrigated all of his growing stuff on the island until a few days ago, when the plant was put out of operation because everything was far enough along not to need water any more.

Several acres are already in fruit on the island and Mr. McComas says it is ripening and some is being marketed. It is not the intention of the company represented by him to raise fruit and vegetables on the island, but to make a stock ranch out of it, raising alfalfa for feed. He thinks there is money in this and will plant several hundred additional acres next winter.

## UNIONS ORGANIZE

### A CENTRAL COUNCIL IS FORMED FOR PENDLETON

Council Will Be Court of Last Resort for Local Unions—Cooks and Waiters Organize and Others Will Follow Suit.

Monday evening delegates selected from the various labor organizations of this city met at Justice Fitz Gerald's office and perfected the organization of the Central Labor Council of Pendleton.

The object of this body is to solidify the different organizations and direct the efforts of the local unions in this channel.

The council is composed of three delegates from each union already formed and will also have three from each yet to be organized. All matters in local unionism which affect other unions will be referred to the council for final adjudication; in fact it is to be the court of last resort for local unions.

#### Officers and Committee.

Officers for the ensuing term were elected as follows: President, C. W. McLyman; vice-president, W. S. Brown; secretary, J. A. Allen; treasurer, Samuel Nell; sergeant-at-arms, William Dupuis; conductor, G. W. McDowell. The president pro-tem, Mr. Lynn, appointed the following committees:

On organization—W. S. Brown, W. J. McDowell and M. C. Kaufman.

On constitution and by-laws—A. W. Fuller, Ed Weaver and J. C. Thompson.

The following unions were represented at the meeting: Clerks, printers, painters, cigar makers, hotel and restaurant employes alliance and wool sorters and graders.

Another meeting will be held at Justice Fitz Gerald's office on Friday evening of this week at which the organization will be completed and application made to the American Federation for a charter.

#### Cooks' and Waiters' Union.

The cooks and waiters of Pendleton have formed an organization known as the Hotel and Restaurant Employees' Alliance and have applied to their international for a charter. They start out with a good membership and much enthusiasm.

The following officers have been elected: President, H. H. Beste; vice-president, W. S. Brown; secretary-treasurer, J. E. Pinson; inspector, Guy McDowell; chaplain, Chas. Baker; inside guard, E. W. Emerson. A committee on organization has been appointed and is doing good work in securing new members. The organization meets every Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

#### Prospective Unions.

Meetings will be held some time during the week for the barbers, bartenders, carpenters and blacksmiths for the purpose of organizing unions of these crafts. It is expected that flourishing organizations for each of these trades will be organized as a result of these meetings.

#### MINING IN AFRICA.

Estimated Large Operations Will Exhaust Deposits in 25 Years.

It is impossible to predict with any accuracy the duration of mining in Witwatersrand district, by reason, especially, of the indeterminate factor of the rate at which exploitation will be carried on. It may be observed, however, that the tendency is to exploit the auriferous areas as

rapidly as possible, and that engineering methods are all adopted with that end in view. If the exploitation of the deeper levels is not delayed pending the proving of the ground lying above, but it carried on concurrently with the exploitation of the higher horizons of the reefs, the the industrial life of the district will of course, be correspondingly shortened. The working of the lower grade ores, made possible by improved economic conditions, or other circumstances, would tend to increase the longevity of the industry. But, were I called upon to express an opinion, I would estimate the future duration of profitable operations on a large scale in the district at less, rather than more, than 25 years.—John Hays Hammond, in The Engineering Magazine for July.
