Ad Rothrock was up from Adams Tuesday, looking contented over the wheat prospects.

Billy Williams is back again at his chair in the barber shop, after wrestling for several tortuous days with pleurisy.

Mrs. H. Kittredge left Thursday for Corvallis to attend the bedside of her father, who is seriously ill. She will be absent until September.

Miss Marie Fletcher is ill at St. Mary's hospital in Walla Walla, where she sustained an operation Tuesday for appendicitis. Her mother, Mrs. H. Key, is in attendance at her bedside.

N. C. Clark of Santa Cruz, Cal., returned Sunday from a pleasant visit to his son in Spokane, which he considers a delightful city. Mr. Clark will visit his daughter, Mrs. H. B. Nelson, until September, when he goes back to his California home.

Freewater, July 11.—The Modern Woodmen of Walla Walla are holding their annual picnic here today, and a glorious time is being had. There is a very large attendance, the Walla Walla members of the order coming down en masse, while from Athena and other points to the south of this city came many members of

the order. A cordial invitation had been extended the various lodges of Umatilla county, to unite with the Walla Walla Woodmen in this picnic, and it was expected that Pendleton would be largely represented. The invitation appears to have been received too late, however, and but few are here from that city. The Freewater band and an organization from Walla Walla are furnishing the music.

Helix Happenings.

Helix, July 11.—Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Shumway, well known Westons, visited friends near Helix the early part of the week. Mr. Shumway said the wheat about Helix looked splendid 'as compared with that around Weston, which has lodged to a considerable extent.

Wheat has so far matured on Dry creek below the crossing that threshing has been begun in several of the earliest fields. By the 15th threshing will be in full swing all the way between here and Weston.

Professor and Mrs. R. E. Story have been visiting for several days at the home of Mrs. Story's sister, Mrs. Frank Richmond, in this place. Mr. and Mrs. Story will shortly leave for the east and Mr. Story will enter Harvard college this fall for a three-years' course.

NO LICENSE REBATE.

Council Decides Not to Allow Reduction for License Paid in Advance.

The city dads transacted the following business Wednesday night in addition to that reported in the East Oregonian Thursday:

Allowed liquor license to Frank Schemp, George Darveau, Polydore Moens and Damian Bros.

Refused to consider the application of Kine & Co. for running their retail liquor resort in Kine's grove 12 days in July without a license. This was asked for on the ground that the license was paid for 12 days before the resort opened for business in June.

The sprinkling committee was instructed to put on a night sprinkling wagon. This will make five wagons during the 24 hours at \$100 each. The dads thought \$100 spent for running a wagon during the night would be money well expended.

A Correction.

It was stated yesterday that Judge Hartman became angry and tore up a bill of \$50 from Arthur Holmes for experting the city's books. The reporter was misinformed in regard to this. The judge did not tear up the bill, but put it in his pocket with the declaration that he would pay it himself. The bill was for five days' work on the books and the city dads thought \$10 a day too much, but Councilman Hartman cited the time when other book experts had done the same work and had been paid \$10 a day without a kick and he thought Holmes' work worth as much as the same work performed by any one else, so he did not want the council to cut the bill, but allow it as presented. This they refused to do, and when the resolution to cut it to \$30 passed, the judge stuck the bill in his pocket and declared that he would pay it.

POWER PLANT AT MILTON.

Possibility That the Mellman-Romo Plant May Go There.

Milton, July 11.—This community is all stirred up over the prospect of securing the principal power station of the proposed Mellman-Romo electric line. The question of whether this will come here or go to Dayton, Wash., is one which is now being decided by Fred Hesse, consulting engineer for the Washington & Oregon Railroad and Electric Power Company.

Mr. Hesse has been looking over the lay of the land here and is being furnished every possible facility for determining the possibilities for power near this city. Five sites have been offered to the company on the Walla Walla river near the city of that name, but the company would prefer to have its power station located at a central point where the electricity could be more generally and economically distributed.

The people of Milton, too, would prefer to have the station here on account of the pay roll which would be something worth while. A considerable addition would be made to the number of residents also. Nothing definite will be determined until Mr. Hesse has viewed the Dayton site.

Speaking of the question of the probable location of the power station, recently, Mr. Mellmann said: "Milton is a point nearer the center of our line than any other where there is the possibility of power at all, and as electricity loses much through transmission, the lesser distance we have to send it along the wires the better it will be. If the power plant were at Dayton it would be extremely difficult to transmit electricity clear to Pendleton, but with the generating apparatus at Milton the trouble would be reduced to a minimum. There is scarcely any doubt that there will be at least a sub-station at Milton. I have engaged W. S. Clark to assist me in the engineering work and a force of men will be put to work at Milton within a few days. We will push the road through as rapidly as possible."
