GENERAL NEWS.

Lena Rohwer, 22 years of age, ran in front of a train at Denver Monday with suicidal intent and lost both legs.

Marconi on Tuesday successfully transmitted a wireless message to Pldhu from Idagen, Denmark, a distance of 500 miles.

An attempt is being made to raise \$60,000 in the United States for the establishment of schools for the education of the children of Porto Rico.

On Monday Bishop Muldoon was appointed administrator of the archdiocese of Chicago, until a successor of the late Archbishop Feehan shall be named.

Undaunted by his past failures, Sir Thomas Lipton will again challenge for the America's cup, and work on the Shamrock III. will shortly be under way.

A cloudburst at What Cheer, Iowa, Sunday night, washed away nine buildings, entailing a loss of \$250,000. A wall of water four feet high rushed down a dry run in the heart of the city at 3 o'clock. Residents barely had time to escape with their lives and were unable to save any property.

Some of the leading chiefs of Manua, who resolved to resist the decision of the high court defining the custom of serving out kava, the Samoan national drink, have been taken into custody by order of Captain Sebree, of the United States gunboat Wheeling, and will be tried for conspiracy.

A professional diver who was to have given an exhibition by jumping from the bridge over the Ohio river at Wheeling, W. Va., failed to show up and rather than spoil the fun of the crowd which had assembled, Thomas McGrane, a messenger boy, took the 150-foot leap to the water below and came out uninjured.

Don Carnes, a 10-year-old lad, is held at Baker City on a charge of wrecking a train on the Sumpter Valley railway.

The first 1902 wheat of the Walla Walla valley was delivered Saturday at Spoofford, a small station 10 miles from Walla Walla.

An attempt to lire the newly-constructed St. Paul's Church at Walla Walla was made by an incendiary during the high wind of Monday. The fire was quickly subdued.

Disappointed in a love affair, John Remington, an employe on P. Hansen's farm near Dallas, took carbolic acid with suicidal intent Monday morning. He was found in the pasture badly burned and suffering intensely. He will die.

The special train carrying sections of the Ashland and Medford fire departments to Grant's Pass during the big fire in that city a few days since, started a fire in Medford which came near being serious, but was luckily put out before much damage had been done.

The county bridge over Hubbard creek, at Milwood, Douglas county, collapsed late Saturday afternoon, while Frank Gorrell was crossing with a load of lumber. His team was killed outright and Mr. Gorrell was so seriously injured that his recovery is doubtful. He was the recent democratic candidate for county treasurer of the county, and a highly esteemed citizen.

A GHASTLY FIND

DECOMPOSED BODY OF MAN FOUND IN FENCE CORNER.

Had Apparently Been Dead Several Days—He Was an Unknown and Seemed to Have Died in an Epileptic Fit.

A ghastly find was made on the old James Daniels place, three miles west of town, Tuesday afternoon. Charles Snider was working in the hay field with his brothers, when he discovered a man lying in the fence corner.

Investigation showed the man to be dead, and young Snider immediately came to town and notified Coroner Cole and Sheriff Taylor. They went to the scene and made an investigation.

The man was found lying in a crouched position on the inside of the field, against a rail fence. It was only a few feet from the wagon road and in plain sight of passers-by, especially when coming toward town. Why it had not been discovered earlier is a mystery. The man had apparently sat down by the fence and suddenly been taken with an epileptic fit or some severe pain and had bent forward, dying in this position with his head resting against the corner of the fence.

Body Brought to Town.

The body was turned over to Undertaker Jesse Falling, who brought it to town. Coroner Cole instructed the sheriff to summon a jury and they followed the body to the cemetery, where an inquest was held. Thorough examination failed to disclose any marks of violence. The clothing was stripped from the body and the pockets thoroughly searched in hopes of finding something that would lead to the identification of the man, but the only things found were a light-colored handkerchief with red checks, a red bow necktie and an empty tobacco sack.

Description of Deceased.

The man was fairly well dressed, having on a black round-cut coat, no vest, two pairs of dark trousers, red striped shirt, No. 8 gaiter shoes, slightly worn, and tan socks. He was a small man, perhaps weighing 140 pounds, five feet six inches tall, wore a truss, showing he had been ruptured, and had about two weeks' growth of beard, without a moustache. His hair set far back on the forehead and was very thin. Little could be told of the features or age owing to the decomposed and colored condition of the face, but the general opinion was that he was from 35 to 45 years of age.

It was admitted that he might be younger than this, for it was impossible to make an accurate guess. He had been dead five or six days.

Coroner's Verdict.

After the examination at the cemetery the jury, Drs. Cole and Botkin, the latter from Athena, accompanied by a representative of the East Oregonian, returned to town and the testimony was taken at the undertaking parlors of Mr. Falling. It had been learned that Thomas Thompson and W. J. Furnish had seen the man Sunday evening when driving by. Mr. Furnish was called to tell what he knew about the man.

Was Seen Sunday.

He said that he and Thompson were passing the Daniels place about 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon and saw a man lying inside the fence, where the body was found, but thought he was drunk and lying there asleep. Thompson called to him but received no response. They drove on, not thinking the man could be dead, and met one of the Snider boys on the road on a bicycle. They told Snider of the man seen, but apparently Snider did not look for the fellow. At least no one reported having seen him again until found yesterday.

After hearing this testimony, Dr. Botkin made a written statement to the effect that the man had apparently died from the effects of convulsions and the jury turned in a verdict to the same effect. The jury was composed of George Hartman, Jr., Phelix Roumagaux, Joe McDill, J. D. Brown, Henry Hennings, and Joe Blakley.

Hat Found.

A soft felt hat was found several yards from where the body was, Monday, by some young people. This was a black hat with Lee Teutsch's brand on the sweat-band and was a size 6 3/4. This is supposed to have been the dead man's which had blown away from the body. It had been worn about a week.

Body Interred.

The body was so decomposed that it was immediately ordered buried by the coroner. Several pieces of the dead man's clothing were kept for relatives or friends to identify him by in case they turn up.

Is Foster Carmine.

Since morning the dead man has been identified by the clothes and description as Foster Carmine. Carmine is quite well known here. He has been employed by Seth Richardson, who runs a dairy one and a half miles below town, and it was Mr. Richardson who recognized the clothes. Mr. Richardson says Carmine had worked for him several different times, and had been at his place about a year the last time. He left Mr. Richardson just one week before being found dead. He had been ill with pains in his stomach for several days and had been in bed a few days, but had partly recovered and came up town. That was the last seen of him by Mr. Richardson, who naturally thought the man had simply concluded to leave and made no inquiry as to his whereabouts.

Had Been in the Asylum.

Mr. Richardson says Carmine had been in the insane asylum at Salem. About eight years ago he was sent from here to the asylum and was away until a year ago, when he returned and went to work for Richardson. He also stated that the deceased had shown unmistakable signs of being slightly off during the past few weeks, but it had been so slight that little notice was taken of it.

Home in Illinois.

Mr. Richardson knows little about the dead man's relatives further than the fact of his saying his home was in Illinois. His relatives will be notified of his death.
