HOTEL MEN ARE ORGANIZED

EMPLOYES OF CATERING ES-
TABLISHMENTS FORM UNION.

Idea is for Protection of Members
Against Cheap Foreign Labor and
Cutting of Wages.

The restaurant and hotel employes
have organized a waiters' union in
Pendleton and hereafter the estab-
lishments will be run by members of
the labor union. They have already
received their charter and started
out with a bright outlook for the fu-
ture. The officers elected are:

W. S. Brown, financial secretary;
G. W. Platt, outside guard; Miss
Hartman, chaplain; D. F. Stillmant,
inspector.

Object of the Union.

The object of this union is not so
much to advance wages of waiters
and employes of hotels and restau-
rants, but to protect white labor
from the invasion of Chinese, Japs
and negroes. Nothing will be done
toward trying to force these out of
such places, except where white
help can be secured and the foreign-
ers are used to supplant them.

Will All Be Union.

Pendleton is fast becoming a
union town. Several organizations
have been organized recently under
the protection of the American Fed-
eration of Labor, and these are work-
ing together getting all classes of
day labor organized.

POWER SITES.

Two Have Been Secured by the Mel-
mann Road.

H. Mellmann, representing the
Washington and Oregon Electric
Railway and Power Company, who
was in town Tuesday, says the com-
pany now has all the power sites
they want. In addition to the site se-
cured at Milton, a site has been se-
cured on the Tukannon, half way be-
tween Dayton and Pomeroy, which
will be made use of in the future.
This will give all the power needed
for years to come. The site was pur-
chased of private holders at a large
sum.

In speaking of the two places for
producing power, Mr. Mellmann said:
"We now have all the power sites we
will want as long as we live. The
Milton site and plant will furnish us
with ample power to run this end of
the road, and the whole thing, for
that matter, but that on Tukannon
will be kept in reserve so in case we
build from Dayton to Pomeroy and
Lewiston we will have a desirable
place for a desirable power plant on
that end."

MET HOLD-UP MEN.

Two Bold, Bad Men, Tried to Get
Deputy Sheriff's Money.
