MEN FOR HARVEST

NOW IS THE DAY OF THE LABORER'S GLORY.

Farmers and Harvest Crew Runners Are Falling Over One Another to Secure Men For the Harvest Fields. Now is the time when the farmers and harvest runners are vying with each other for men to work in the harvest field.

It is not expected that there will be any trouble in getting plenty of men for the harvest but they will not be a drug on the market. It is estimated that no less than 700 or 800 men are now in Pendleton awaiting the harvest season to open so they can go to work. Most of these will be out of town within a week. While harvest will not begin within in earnest in all sections over the county for another week most of the men are being gobbled up. Farmers believing in getting their help "early and avoiding the rush," at the same time getting their pick out of the men wanting work.

Many have taken out their crews and are keeping them busy putting up hay so as to be sure to have them when they are ready to start their headers and threshers.

Wages offered this season are practically the same as what has been paid for the past two years and there is no complaint from the men seeking work in regard to the wages offered. Most of them recognize the fact that they are being offered a good figure and are content.

It would be expected that the employment offices would be doing a land office business these days but such is not the case. The man looking for work in the harvest field prefers to stand on the street corners and make his own bargains with the man looking for help. In this way the men usually know who they are going to work for.

The men who have worked in the fields of this county for many years past mingle with the men who come into town from other places and each man is "put onto" the farmer who is hard to work for.

Consequently every man tries to get a job from the man who has the reputation of being "easy." This method has been in vogue from time immemorial and will remain so until the end. As a result the employment office is ignored.

CANDIDATES FOR OFFICES.

Wisconsin Politicians Are Fixing Up Their Slates.

Madison, Wis., July 15.—Delegates and politicians generally are flocking into Madison for what promises to be one of the liveliest state conventions the Badger state has witnessed in recent years. The republic can state convention to nominate candidates for governor and other state officers to be chosen this fall will be called to order at noon tomorrow by George E. Bryant, chairman of the state committee.

Though Governor La Follette will be able to control the convention so far as securing his own renomination the opposition of the "stalwarts" is considered of sufficient strength to make things lively. Unless all indications go astray there will be a lively time on the convention floor when resolutions are introduced indorsing John C. Spooner for re-election to the senate. La Follette and his lieutenants make no effort to hide their intention to oppose this resolution with all the strength at their command.

La Follette proposes to make a clean sweep of everything, and will not be afraid of being swept off the political map himself by any popular wave in the convention for Spooner.

The La Follette people do not believe that La Follette can be beaten at anything he undertakes at politics and that if he starts out to hang the scalp of the popular Mr. Spooner to his belt he will do it, for the convention is his, they say, to do as he pleases, and he fought hard and long to get it. Besides the head of the ticket candidates will be named for lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, insurance commissioner, attorney general and superintendent of public instruction. For all the places on the ticket there are several aspirants in the field and all of them are busily engaged today in conducting button-hole campaigns among the delegates who have arrived.

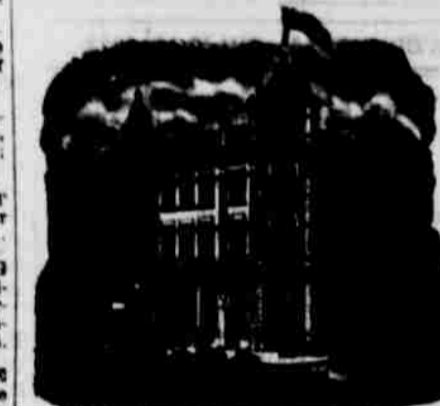
