### GENERAL NEWS.

Tremendous explosions have occurred at the Waimangu geiser at Rotorua, a height of 800 to 900 feet being reached.

The Great Northern, Oregon Short Line, Northern Pacific, O. R. & N., and Chicago Great Western railroads were Tuesday admitted to membership in the Transcontinental Passenger Association.

The steamer Mariposa, which sailed from San Francisco Tuesday for Tahiti, will use oil instead of coal for fuel. The experiment is being made to test the fuel for the use of the navy department.

It is learned that the charges embodied in a petition to Mr. Wu, the Chinese minister, made some time ago against Ho Yow, the Chinese consul-general at San Francisco, entirely failed of substantiation.

Thirty persons were drowned Tuesday by the sinking of a small passenger steamer on the Luge River, near Probroa-Schenskain. The disaster was caused by over-crowding. Only those who were on the upper deck were saved.

The Detroit Driving Club's classic Merchants' and Manufacturers' \$10,000 stake for 2:24 class trotters, was won at Grosse Point track Tuesday afternoon in hollow fashion by Rhythmic, a blind horse owned by Jesse Turney, of Paris, Ky., that had never before been started in a race.

Rev. John S. Brown, known as "Father Brown," died at the home of his daughter, at Lawrence, Kan., Tuesday, aged 96 years. He was one of the few survivors of the famous Brooke farm experiment, and was the oldest Unitarian minister and the oldest member of the honorary college society of Phi Beta Kappa.

The Helena Water Works Company notified the city Tuesday that its bill for June not having been paid, it would shut off water for fire and sewerage purposes at noon July 24. The city served the company with notice that should it attempt to shut off the water it would be prosecuted for contempt under the order of the late Judge Horace R. Buck, made in 1895, and that steps would be taken to forfeit its franchise.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The 33d annual session of the grand lodge of Washington, Independent Order of Good Templars, opened at Seattle Tuesday, and will continue until Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Mary Reed, an attendant at the Salem asylum, was assaulted by a violent female patient Tuesday and sustained a severe gash on the head but the injury will not prove serious.

Mrs. W. R. Adair, an old lady, nearly 80 years of age, living about four miles north of Silverton, was kicked on the leg by a cow Tuesday, and both bones of the member broken near the ankle.

While squirrel hunting Tuesday, 7-year-old David Lyons was shot through the heart and instantly killed by another boy named Hawkinson, at Lake Roesiger, near Machias, Wash. A 22-calibre bullet glanced on the fence.

The report of the Oregon state penitentiary for the quarter ending June 30, shows 318 convicts in custody, against 319 at the close of the last quarter. The total expenditures were \$9102, or 32 cents per day. Earnings for the quarter were \$3825.

In the neighborhood of 200 claims have already been located this season near the headwaters of the Deschutes River, in the northern part of the county, and along Sprague River, in the eastern part. Some of the claims have also been taken on Wood River and others near Keno. Several bodies of timber yet untouched promise to pass from government ownership before snow flies.

## REACH AGREEMENT

ELECTRIC LINE PROMOTERS AND AUTHORITIES AGREE.

Franchise Is Granted, Signed, Sealed and Delivered—List of the Provisions of the Contract as Entered Into.

An agreement has been reached between the county officials and the Washington & Oregon Electric Railway, Light and Power Company promoters and the franchise and agreement has been signed by the county officials. This was done at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

The provisions of the franchise are:

The life of the franchise is to be 25 years. The company may select its roadbed and is allowed to follow the county road from the county line, through Milton, Freewater, Weston, Adams and Helix, to Pendleton, except along the Wild Horse and Lee street grade.

Work must be commenced within six months or the franchise is void. The road must be completed within two years and trains in operation or the franchise dies.

After work has commenced it must be pushed continuously until the road is completed.

At least \$2,500 must be expended per month on the work of construction.

All bridges must be built and maintained by the company.

The electric poles erected by the company may be used by the county for telephone poles.

At the expiration of the contract—franchise, the county is privileged to purchase the road and business at a reasonable figure.

The company must furnish the county court house and poor farm with lights during the life of the franchise. The amount of lights, however must not exceed 2,000 candle power.

The county must be paid \$5 a mile for every mile of road bed built the first year and \$10 per mile for all built the second year.

Thereafter the county court can designate what the company must pay up to \$35. Above that the price cannot go. This is to be paid into the county general fund.

Cars must be run daily, but it is left to the option of the company to say how many they will run.

The estimated cost of the road from Pendleton to the county line is \$600,000.

### AIRSHIPS AT THE FAIR.

Rules Governing the Contests for the \$100,000 Prize and Minor Prizes.

World's Fair Grounds, St. Louis, July 15.—The rules and regulations to govern the airship tournaments at the World's Fair will be published in pamphlet form with diagrams of the course in a few days. The contest is for airships, balloons and kites. Of the \$200,000 appropriated there will be a first prize of \$100,000, also minor prizes. There will be no limit to the number of competitors. The balloons and airships must carry one passenger each and the competitor must have made a trip of not less than a mile with a machine similar to the one entered in the contest. The entrance fee is \$250, which will be refunded when the entries appear on the day of the races. The entire course must be traveled three times at a speed of not over 20 miles an hour. The course will not be less than 10 miles nor more than 15 miles in length. The contests will take place June 1, and September 30, 1904.

### Gamblers Leaving.
