FEEDING OF LAMBS

INTERESTING ARTICLE ON
SUBJECT BY AN EXPERT.

Results of Experiments Performed at Idaho Government Station With Oregon Bred Lambs From Pendleton.

Professor H. T. French, of the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station, has recently written an article on the subject of feeding lambs which was published in a bulletin issued by that institution. The matter of feeding lambs or sheep of any kind, he states, has not been given much attention by farmers in Idaho. While there has been some experiments in Southern Idaho, there had been but little in Northern Idaho, this section being devoted principally to wheat raising.

The experiments were undertaken to determine the economy, if there should be any, in feeding range lambs in close quarters for a few months during the winter. The lambs used in the experiment were purchased of C. B. Wade, of Pendleton, and were the result of crossing purebred Shropshire and Oxford down rams on range Merino ewes. The lambs are reported to have been a very even lot and were all weathers. They were received in Moscow November 1, and the feeding began November 15.

Experimental Feeding.

In the first experiment 20 of the best lambs were selected to feed for the Christmas market. They were placed in a box stall and were fed on grain ration of whole wheat and oats, one and one-half pounds per head, with all of the rough feed they could consume. They averaged 75 pounds each when the feeding began and December 21, after 36 days' feeding, they averaged 80½ pounds, a gain of 5½ pounds. The reason that the gain was not greater is charged to the lambs being closely confined, stating that plenty of shed room is necessary. The lambs sold for \$4.50 a hundred, live weight, making a gross income of 87 cents a head over original cost. The cost of the grain food was 40½ cents for each and this left 46½ cents for the rough food consumed.

The excuse for this small profit is given in the statement that there is no distinction in the market, where the lambs had to be sold, between sheep and lambs, and that the market at that time was very dull.

Another Experiment.

Another experiment was made with 59 lambs from the same band, at the time, beginning feeding November 15, and continuing until February 26, following, a period of 103 days. These lambs were not so heavy to begin with as the others and a different method was used.

They were fed on pea hay, clover hay, corn silage, roots and whole grain made up of oats and wheat in a proportion of one-third wheat and two-thirds oats. The grain was weighed at each feeding, but the coarse feed was not. The grain was given in two feeds, morning and evening, and was fed in the bottom of the feed racks. The lambs were permitted to run in the feed yard a short time each day, where they secured water from a trough. The remainder of the time they were confined in box stalls where they were kept dry and received ventilation from windows in the basement.

They Made a Good Gain.

The 59 head consumed during the experiment 6700 pounds of grain, or a daily average of 1.10 pounds a head. They gained a total of 1250 pounds, an average gain of 20.18 pounds each, or a daily gain of each of .20 pounds.

The lambs cost \$2.15 per head, a total of \$126.25. Selling price, less 5 per cent reduction for shrinkage, was \$234.85, giving a gross income of \$71.60. Taking from this the cost of the grain at \$15 a ton, making a total of \$50.25, leaves \$21.35 for the coarse feed consumed.

Reason for Small Profits.

As an excuse for the small profit realized, it is stated that the price received was not adequate, not nearly so good as should have been expected. But it is urged that the work of feeding lambs in that section may be carried on with success. It is admitted that the climate is not so good as at other points, where the weather is not so damp, but is colder, but the gentleman is by no means discouraged with the results.

Breed Was Best.

The breed purchased from Mr. Wade were regarded as among the best and the purchase was made with the view of giving the test with one of the best breeds, having a view to the future, which it is predicted will find that only the best breeds will be used in this country.

The experiments with less valuable breeds were not nearly so satisfactory, and this is in line with the general inclination to look to finer breeds in all lines of stock raising.

Bryan's Trip East.

Lincoln, Neb., July 15.—William J. Bryan goes East this week and from all indications there is to be

more politics than pleasure in the trip. He is to confer with Lewis Nixon, the deposed Tammany leader, and later will go to Boston to attend the annual banquet of the democratic league of that city, which will be in the nature of a counter demonstration to the recent harmony feast of the Tilden Club of New York. While in Boston he will confer with George Fred Williams and other New England leaders of the Bryan wing of the Democratic party.

BIG HAY CROP.

Peter West's Fields This Year Give Bumper Yields.

Peter West, the hay king, has a crew of 20 men cutting and putting up hay on his ranch, joining town on the south. Mr. West has a ranch consisting of 720 acres and has 500 acres of this in hay. He does not pretend to raise wheat for grain, but puts all of his land in wheat for hay.

The crew has been at work two weeks and will finish this week. He says beside the 20 men he has four mowers running, one rake and six wagons. When finished he expects to have 700 tons of the finest wheat hay on the market. Last year Mr. West had 300 acres and harvested 500 tons. This was all sold at a good price. In the field he received \$10 a ton and \$12 delivered.

He could have sold several hundred more tons had he had it. Peter says at this price there is more money in raising hay than wheat. He thinks he has enough this season to supply the demand.
