port of Capital Coming in.

A ripple of excitement was caused  
throughout Baker City says the Dem-  
ocrat, when it was learned that cer-  
tain Eastern capitalists had decided  
to invest in the Baker-Malheur oil  
fields. They will send their expert  
there in a short time and put a rig  
in operation and bore for oil in the  
center of the district. They are men  
of experience and have plenty of  
money, and if the indications are  
borne out by results, there will be the  
largest influx of capital and people  
in this district ever known in Eastern  
Oregon.

These people are well versed in  
all the peculiarities of the oil fields  
of Pennsylvania, Texas, Colorado and  
California and have such connections  
that it will be a simple matter for  
them to build up an entirely new  
country, new markets, new towns in  
Eastern Oregon. They mean busi-

### PENNIES FOR GREAT BUILDING.

The Temple of Fraternity at the  
World's Fair Will Be Paid for With  
the Mites of Many.

World's Fair Grounds, St. Louis  
July 18.—Copies of a circular letter  
issued by the supreme hive of the  
Ladies of the Maccabees at Port Hu-  
ron, Mich., with reference to raising  
the fund for the Temple of Fraterni-  
ty at the World's Fair, have been re-  
ceived here. The ladies' fraternal or-  
ganization will raise \$50,000 of the  
\$200,000 fund. The assessments  
among the ladies for this purpose  
range from 5 to 10 cents per capita  
according to the strength of the or-  
der. Many appropriations ranging  
from \$2000 to \$5000 each have been  
made by the Masons and other bodies  
from their general funds, but the bulk  
of the sum will be in small contribu-  
tions. The project has been indorsed  
by the Maccabees, Modern Wood-  
men, Ancient Order of United Work-  
men, Odd Fellows, Eastern Stars, Re-  
bekas, college fraternities, Grand  
Army of the Republic, Women's Re-  
lief Corps, Degree of Honor, Royal  
Neighbors and others. The temple  
will be 200 by 300 feet, having a cen-  
tral court and will contain about 80  
rooms for the headquarters of 80 dif-  
ferent fraternal orders at the World's  
Fair.
