Walla penitentiary to begin an 11year sentence for murder. After leaving this city, Ellis went to Ellensburg, Wash., in company with John Stanley, who also bore an unsavory reputation here, and on May 3 the two men became engaged in an altercation over a gambling game in Oscar Rentsche's saloon in

that city. Words were followed by blows and in the fight which ensued Ellis shot and killed Stanley. He was tried before Judge Rudkin, convicted and sentenced to 11 years, which term he will soon tegin serving.


