The Beet Pullers have a strong aggregation and when the hoodoo has once been removed they will make it interesting for the other teams in the Inland Empire league.

COYOTE SCALP FRAUDE.

How California People Beat the Bounty Law.

Here is a hint for those who are in the coyote scalp business.

Word comes from California to the effect that many people in that state are going to the scalp business on a large scale. The way they do it is to catch the coyotes, young or old, as many of them as can be secured

alive, scalp them and sell the scalps to the state.

The coyote is turned loose and left to breed more for the industry. While this story sounds a little fishy, it is credited as truth by California newspapers.

It is not claimed that the second scalp will grow on the coyote once he has been scalped but it is claimed they will live and breed just the same. Every female coyote is good for from 10 to 15 young ones every spring. These old ones are scalped turned loose and their young are scalped and served the same way.

Other methods of defrauding the state have been adopted but this is the most outrageous one. The makers of the law and the taxpayers may also get a hint from the way they do it in California.

TO DO HIS TIME.

Jack Ellis, Well Known Here, Will Soon Commence Service in Pen.

Jack Ellis, a tin-horn gambler known to the sporting fraternity and police circles of this city, through various escapades, and who is strongly suspected of being the leader of the gang which held up and robbed the Maze saloon here last year will shortly be received at the Walla Walla penitentiary to begin an 11-year sentence for murder.

After leaving this city, Ellis went to Ellensburg, Wash., in company with John Stanley, who also bore an unsavory reputation here, and on May 3 the two men became engaged in an altercation over a gambling game in Oscar Rentsche's saloon in that city.

Words were followed by blows and in the fight which ensued Ellis shot and killed Stanley. He was tried before Judge Rudkin, convicted and sentenced to 11 years, which term he will soon begin serving.

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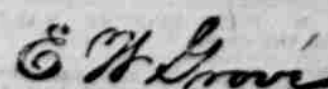
