## IN THE CITY POLICE COURT

JUDGE M'COURT HAD A BUSY TIME TODAY.

Had an Assault Case Where He Put on a Nice Fine and Also a Case of Using Indecent Language.

Judge McCourt, of the police court, has been dealing out justice to the law-breakers during the last 24 hours.

Monday afternoon Sam L. Brassfield and B. Benedict were before him for assault on S. J. Ayres. They were each fined \$15. Brassfield, Benedict and Ayres had been drinking together and after they had become somewhat intoxicated Brassfield claimed that he lost \$30. He accused Ayres of taking it out of his pocket. He and Benedict went into the "Last Chance" saloon and began to abuse Ayres, accusing him of robbing Brassfield. They knocked Ayres down and beat him up considerably, and the fine was the result. The fine was paid.

This morning Eugene Mumford, a colored lad who blacks boots in front of the Louvre saloon, was taken before Judge McCourt on the charge of using indecent language on the streets. He was fined \$5, which was paid.

In administering the fine to Mumford, the judge gave him a lecture on using foul and indecent language on the streets, and said it was not the court's intention to make an example out of the accused, but the use of profane and indecent language on the streets was becoming too frequent and he proposed to see if a stop could not be put to it. He said it was getting so a lady could hardly walk down the sidewalks, especially along Main street from Court to Alta without hearing all kinds of foul words coming from mouths of men. He said hereafter an effort would be made to stop it and every man heard swearing or using indecent language on the streets would be looked after. Mumford had become angered at Tom Scott, was the cause of the trouble.

## GAME IS PLENTIFUL.

Wild Animals Abound in the Neighborhood of Susanville.

H. L. Briggs, formerly of Weston, but now of Walla Walla, was in town Monday evening on his way from Susanville, where he has been developing placer claims in which he and his brother are interested. Mr. Briggs says Susanville is lively and forging to the front right along.

In speaking of the road conditions from here to Susanville and the prospects of ore being hauled to Pendleton instead of Whitney, Mr. Briggs said:

The road is good from Pendleton to the Grant county line. From there to Susanville it is almost impossible to pass over the road with a load. If this part of the road was made good most of the business would, perhaps, come this way, although it is 96 miles from Susanville here and only 65 to Whitney. The advantage in coming here is the fact that teamsters can load back with freight and they will haul out from Susanville to Pendleton at the same figure they will to Whitney, because they can always return with a load, making wages both ways instead of one."

In speaking of game in the Susanville country, Mr. Briggs said bear were very plentiful and some deer had been seen. Huckleberries are beginning to ripen and the bear are following them down into the lower country. Later on, when the haws ripen, he said, the bear would all come from the higher part of the country into the river and creek bottoms and would then be quite plentiful.

## New Flying Machine.

Brussels, July 22.—A Belgian inventor, M. Villars, has constructed a new flying machine and will probably enter it for the contest at the St. Louis World's Fair. The apparatus is light and very simple in design. The motor is fitted with a vertical shaft, constructed in such a way as to support a horizontal shaft provided with a gearing of toothed and cogged wheels, and working two large screws which act vertically and impart the force necessary. The vertical shaft supports also, a little below the main shaft, another small horizontal shaft, which it puts into movement in the same manner, and which, by means of two small screws, controls the horizontal movement of the apparatus.

## Bayreuth Festival Opens.

Bayreuth, July 22.—The Bayreuth festival opened today, with a splendid performance of "Parsifal." Siegfried Wagner conducted the performance. The town is full of strangers, and the number of American and English visitors is larger than for a number of years. The season continues four weeks, during which time there are to be seven performances of "Parsifal," five of "The Flying Dutchman," and two of the cycle of "The Nibelung's Ring."

## Texas Guard in Camp.

Austin, Texas, July 22.—From all indications the encampment of the Texas Volunteer Guard which opened today will be the most successful in the history of the organization. Within an hour after Major General Stacy had raised his flag at Camp Maybry this morning the men had their tents pitched and the routine of camp life was in full swing, the same as if the young soldiers had been old veterans. While military instruction is the primary purpose of the encampment and the maintenance of rigid discipline one of the cardinal features of the program the soldiers are to have plenty of opportunity to enjoy the pleasant features of camp life. The sanitary arrangements are excellent and nothing has been left undone by those in charge to make the encampment a notable success.

## Railroad Men at Minneapolis.

Minneapolis, Minn., July 22.—More than 500 prominent railroad officials many of whom are accompanied by their wives and families, are attending the sixth annual convention of the National Association of Railway Agents in session here. While there is some business to be attended to the convention is largely of a social nature and during the week there will be pleasure trips to Lake Minnetonka, Fort Snelling, Minnehaha Falls and other places of interest in the vicinity of Minneapolis.

## Montana Woolgrowers.

Great Falls, Mont., July 22.—The North Montana Woolgrowers' Association is holding its second annual meeting in this city with a large attendance of prominent growers from the six great woolgrowing counties of the northern Montana. Colonel J. H. Rice, of Benton, is the presiding officer. A two days' program has been arranged calling for papers and discussions on numerous questions of interest and importance to those engaged in the industry.

## Master Painters of Ohio.

Toledo, O., July 22.—About 200 members of the Ohio Master Painters and Decorators' Association are attending the annual convention of the organization. The business sessions were commenced in Memorial hall today and will continue until Friday. The local association has arranged an interesting program for the guests after the business sessions and trips to the lake resorts near the city will be enjoyed.

## Renominates Smith.

Council Bluffs, Ia., July 22.—Republicans of the ninth congressional district met in convention here today, and renominated Congressman Walter I. Smith, of this city, by acclamation.

## TO SEPARATE DISTRICTS.

Division of Oregon and Washington and Alaska Revenue Districts Soon to be Made.

Separation of the newly created internal revenue districts of Washington and Alaska from Oregon will be effected within a very short time. The revenue office at Portland awaits only the order from Washington, D. C., to establish the new district, the collector for which will be B. D. Crocker, of Walla Walla, who has already made requisition for the necessary supplies of his new office.

Another point to be settled by the department before the new district is formally established is the location of the office for the district. A report on this matter has been sent in by Internal Revenue Agent of the Treasury Department Col. W. A. Gavert and upon this will depend whether Seattle or Tacoma will get the office.

Everything is in readiness at the Portland office for the creation of the new district and the transfer will be made with hardly a ripple of confusion.
