DIAMOND CHATTER

TALK OF GAME IN INLAND EMPIRE LEAGUE.

Excursion to La Grande Is Proposed
—How Confidence of Home Team Helps to Success—Chat and Chatter.

The fans of this city are now agitating a proposition for a special train from Pendleton to La Grande on Sunday next, for the purpose of taking in the final game of the series to be played there between the Beet Pullers and the Indians on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, of this week.

Last Sunday nearly 200 enthusiasts from the beet garden, came over on a special to witness the final game here, and the local sports feel that if La Grande can raise enough enthusiasm to bring so many over here to witness a game after their team has made three straight losses, this city should certainly have enough enthusiasm to reciprocate in kind.

The O. R. & N. has always been very liberal with excursion parties, and will make an extremely low rate for a special from here to La Grande so there should be but little difficulty in arranging for the excursion.

Have Confidence in the Team.

The papers in Walla Walla are full of discussions now days as to what shall be done to get better work out of their baseball team, and along these lines the Union remarks:

"If the people and the management would take the players into their confidence and give them a little encouragement, the scores would be better and the work done by the team would prove far more effective."

After going on to say that there have been too many "rapid fire" roasters in the grand stand and bleachers, and advising that the people instead of geying their players and telling them that their work is "rotten," do a little boosting and pat the boys on the back a little, the paper continues:

"Get your team together—keep it together. If your men have weak spots you learn to know them. If they have strong points they soon are learned also."

"The Walla Walla people would do far better to slap the players on the back and say, 'We are all with you! We have the team as it is going to stay, unless after every man has been tried steadily and thoroughly, we can see a change will be beneficial. Do not pay any attention to your records. We will not judge you by them. What we want is the pennant, and if you take hard chances and err we will cheer you just the same as though you had not fallen down, for the effort will show that your hearts are in the right place. Stick to your training rules and play ball the best way you know how."

"When this is done the fans will get a chance to see good ball and Walla Walla will lose her present position at the tail end of the list."

Pendleton Always Confident.

Along these lines it may be mentioned that the supreme confidence felt and freely expressed by Pendleton fans and baseball enthusiasts in their Indians, has had much to do in keeping them at the lead of the recent summer season league, and later at the head of the present league.

There has never been a time when the people of this city have lost faith in the ability of the Indians to beat any and all comers and Pendleton money has always been ready to back the team on all propositions. Such confidence could not help inspire the men, and no matter how tight a place they have been in they have always felt that the heavy way in which they were cheered on and urged to do their best by the fans, was almost enough in itself to place victory within their grasp.

At the very least, it has given them much greater confidence in themselves and this confidence has brought success on many a hard-fought field.

Line Hits.

It seems probable that La Grande will be forced to part with the valuable services of Danny Shea, as a number of the players on that team have positively refused to play another game with him.

Two cracker-jacks from the east are said to be coming out to strengthen the Beet Pullers' aggregation. La Grande papers say that "Grandpa" Menefee was spliced in Sunday's game. It rather looked to the spectators as though it was "Angel Child" who got it in the neck.

The Walla Walla Union insinuates that certain players on the Sharpshooter team are suspected of "throwing" the games there to work in with the gamblers. This must be encouraging to the team members.

Walla Walla is still "reorganizing" her team. Four new men are to go on before the team goes to Baker

City for its series this week. "Dickie" Knox, late center gardner for the Indians, "Pink" Hawley, a former Butte pitcher, and a good one; Treadwell, another Northwest League man, and George Croll, of the S. A. C., are the names mentioned.

Pitcher Cryderman, who during the summer season pitched and won three games in four days for the Sharpshooters, has been given his release. McEvoy, right fielder for the team, has also been turned loose.

Baseball by electric light is the latest novelty in the national game. There will probably be no more changes in the Pendleton team this season, the management knowing when they have a good thing and being willing to stick to it.

WORK WILL SOON START

ELECTRIC LINE FROM DAYTON TO PENDLETON.

Rails Have Already Been Ordered and Work Will Be Commenced in a Very Short Time.

This is what the promoters of the Washington & Oregon Electric Railway, Light and Power Company, had to say regarding the road when interviewed by the Spokane newspapers recently:

"Permits have been obtained from Columbia, Walla Walla and Umatilla counties for the use of the county roads. The rails have been ordered from Germany, and it now looks as though the long-talked-of project will turn out to be an actuality. Consulting Engineer Hesse, of Portland, has the surveys and plans about completed, and track-laying will begin as early next spring as possible. Such a road has been talked of for years, but until about three months ago, when the company was formed, no real progress had been made. The objects of the road will be quick and cheap transportation to Walla Walla, the metropolis of that section and furnishing of light to the towns of Pomeroy, Dayton, Walla Walla and Waiilatburg. The total cost of the project will be in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000.

"The road runs through a district which contains a population of about 40,000 people. Passengers and light baggage will be carried by the cars. It is 70 miles from Dayton to Pendleton, and a trip will be made every two hours, as the cars will have a speed of about 35 miles an hour. The rails will follow the country roads, which in that section are quite favorable in the matter of grades. The work has been let to the Northwestern Construction company, of Portland.

Two Power Houses.

"There will be two power houses erected, which will have a combined power of 5000 horse power. A 60 inch pipe will be put in the Walla Walla river at Dorrit's ranch, near Milton. The power from this will be used mainly in running the car lines. Another power house will be built at Two Canyons, near Dayton, at the fall, and no hydraulic pipe will be necessary. The power there will be used mainly in the lighting of adjacent towns. Consulting Engineer Hesse is now there surveying with a force of eight men.

"The construction of the line will of enormous benefit to the towns of Dayton, Walla Walla and Pendleton. Cheap fares will be the rule, and, except for wheat, the company will do considerable freighting."
