EXTENDED INVITATION.

Editors' Day at Walla Walla Fruit Fair Will Be a Big Event—Ball Boys Leave for Baker.
Walla Walla, July 24.—The local Press Club has issued an invitation to Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Portland Morning Oregonian, to visit this city during the meeting of the State Press Association and deliver an address on Editors' day at the fruit fair. So far no response has been received, but it is taken here as settled that Mr. Scott will accept. The meeting will be a specially interesting one if Mr. Scott delivers an address, as he has many strong friends all over Washington as well as Oregon. Other able newspaper men will be asked to speak during the meeting of the state association. It is expected that fully 100 newspaper people will be in the city during the state convention, which has been set for the week during which the fruit fair will be in its glory.

RIGHT OF PRIVACY.

Recent Decision of New York Court of Appeals on Subject.

A recent decision of the New York court of appeals holds flatly that there is no redress for the publication of a portrait, not libelous, of another person without his consent, even for the purpose of advertising the goods of the publisher.
The decision was made in an injunction suit brought by a woman to prohibit the use by a firm of her photograph as an advertisement. In the lower court she had won the case, that court having invented a new right, which it called, "the right of privacy."
But the highest court of the state not only denies that there is such a right in law, but holds that if it were adopted as a general principle it would logically lead to absurd and oppressive litigation.
As presented, the case does involve a hardship on the young woman. But it is doubtless true as the upper court decided that "the right of privacy once established as a legal doctrine, cannot be defined to the restraint of the publication of a likeness, but must necessarily embrace any unauthorized disturbance of personal privacy even though not an assault nor a libel. Such a "right" might raise havoc with other and more important rights.

BACK WITH HORSE THIEF.

Officers Taking Jack Thomas to Okanogan County.

Deputy Sheriff G. W. Tindell and Deputy F. J. Moore, of Okanogan county, passed through town this morning on their way from Portland with Jack Thomas, who was their prisoner wanted in Okanogan county for horse stealing. Thomas is charged with the theft of a horse belonging to a farmer in April, 1901, but it is said that he is wanted for more than the one offense. Bill Wheeler is jointly charged with Thomas but he has not been apprehended.

Thomas is well known here, among the gambling fraternity, especially. He will be remembered as having been arrested here a few weeks ago and taken to Portland charged with selling liquor to Indians. He was released on this charge but was held by the Portland officers until the Okanogan officers arrived and took him on the more serious charge of horse stealing. He willingly submitted to be taken back to into Washington without requisition papers from this state.

Messrs. Tindell and Moore say that the citizens of Okanogan county are becoming very much annoyed at the depredations of the horse thieves and every effort is being made to put a stop to the business. It is likely that Thomas will get several years in the penitentiary as an example to others who might have a desire to follow in his footsteps.
