COMMERCE—TRADE

NOT VERY MUCH CHANGE REPORTED IN LOCAL MARKETS

Watermelons Have Made Their Appearance—Old Potatoes Nearly Out of Market—Eggs Are Up to 25c per Dozen.

Watermelons are now on the market. A small lot was received by local grocers this morning and are selling at 50 cents each. These came from California and are the first to reach Pendleton.

The old potatoes are practically off the market and new potatoes have dropped from 2 1/2 cents to 1 1/2 cents per pound.

Eggs have gone up to 25 cents a dozen and are scarce at this figure. These are the only changes in the local markets for the past week.

The Portland Wheat Market.

Portland, July 24.—The Commercial Review, in its issue today, says of the wheat market:

The market continues extremely dull, the small business done being of a dragging character, mostly on milling account. Offerings have been light and receipts from both sections are almost nil. Prices are weak and against sellers, being nominal at 64c for Walla Walla, 67c for bluestem and 66c per bushel for valley. There will be very little doing from now on until harvest is well under way.

Harvesting has begun in Oregon and Washington the past week and from now on we will expect to hear some phenomenal yields. We have received predictions of the size of the coming crop that is not yet harvested, from 50 to 75 million bushels for Oregon, Washington and Idaho. It is too early to predict whether prices will go up or down, at present prices are 10c per bushel higher than a year ago and it looks as if the market for new wheat will open nearly at present quotations.

San Francisco Markets.

San Francisco, July 24.—Although we can note no improvement in the demand, nor any signs of activity being near at hand, there is a hardening undertone and prices are very firm. Wheat is not moving freely.

The export movement this month so far is dull, only a few vessels having been dispatched. No. 1 shipping is

quoted \$1.13 1/2 @ 1.15; milling, \$1.17 1/2 @ 1.20 per cental.

Boston Wool.

Boston, July 24.—A number of the big corporations have been buyers, as well as a large number of smaller manufacturers, during the week just past, and these have made it the record week on wool sales of the present year. All grades show a strong upward tendency and prices are higher in several instances. Territory wools are selling freely with considerable new wool being taken, as well as old. Prices are very strong. Fine staple territories, 50 @ 52c; strictly fine, 50 @ 51c; fine and fine medium, 48 @ 49c; medium, 41 @ 43c.
