INDIANS WON FIRST GAME WITH BEET PULLERS.

Making Fifth Straight They Have Captured From the Boys From the Beet Fields.

Pendleton did things to the Beet Pullers at La Grande Thursday in a very poor exhibition of the national game, making the fifth straight game which they have taken from the Grande Ronde boys with the showing made getting worse all the time. The train on which the Indians went over to La Grande was several hours late in getting out of Pendleton, owing to the wreck of the Buffalo Bill car near Willows, and the game was not called until 4:15 p. m. The sun was low, which accounts for the numerous hits, runs and errors on each side. The grounds were also in poor condition. McBirney, who was pitching for La Grande, attempted to pick a quarrel with Wilner, the Indian's pitcher, in the fifth inning, and was sent to the bench by the umpire. McGucken, a new arrival took his place. There were no sensational features of the playing and the game as a whole was uninteresting. The umpiring was very bad. Pendleton's heavy stick wielders were right there with the goods and two-base hits were landed by Brown and Schills, the latter of whom also took three sacks on another hit. Menefee smashed a two-sacker and Black hit for three, for the La Grande batting honors.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Argentine, Kan., smelter, at one time the largest in the world has been closed down and is being dismantled.

Daring Americans held up a train on a Mexican railway near Bernijillo and secured \$50,000 in currency and many valuables.

An alleged cure for leprosy has been submitted by a Brooklyn physician to the health authorities of the Hawaiian Islands.

The recently-formed Morgan ship combine is declared by British leaders to be a menace to British commerce, and is causing considerable anxiety.

Mrs. Elizabeth Chase Ingalls, mother of the late United States Senator John J. Ingalls, of Kansas, is dead, at her home, Haverhill, Mass., aged 90 years.

Indians from the Mexican side of the boundary, are reported to be slaughtering large quantities of game in a mountain park 45 miles southwest of Delta, Col.

The United States government is now engaged in paying the bills incurred by the murder of President McKinley. The itemized accounts will not be published, but after all bills are paid the sum total will be made public.

Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Graham, of Spokane, Christian Scientists, have been found guilty of causing the death of two children through criminal neglect. They tried Christian Science on the children when sick, instead of calling a doctor.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Ernest Lane, a 14-year-old Salem boy, has been arrested at that place on a charge of burglary.

Portland health authorities have found several lots of diseased meat on sale in the butcher shops of that city.

Mrs. Martha Jane Cummins, an Oregon pioneer of 1852, died Tuesday at Tualatin. She had lived in this state for 50 years.

A wheel of fortune is reported to be running on a public street in Portland, which is supposed to be a "closed" town.

Marie DeMons, formerly a restaurant waiter in New York, is now on her way west to claim a fortune of \$80,000 left her by an uncle who died in Portland eight years ago.

John Montag and Henry Cleaver have been enjoined at Portland from manufacturing a stove similar in appearance to that put out by the Simmons Hardware Company, St. Louis.

The case of Edward Wilcox vs. the Southern Pacific Railway Company, asking for \$200 damages for injuries received from a train, near Hillsboro, has been settled by the jury awarding \$700 damage.

A new wrinkle in hop dealing has been introduced by New York buyers, who are contracting Oregon crops in the field, assuming all risks and looking after the picking and packing themselves.

F. E. Damon has brought suit in the circuit court at Portland to collect \$5213 damages from Samuel Mazurovsky, for injuries received from the accidental discharge of a revolver in the hands of the latter.

Surveyor-General Meldrum has received notice from Washington City that the sum of \$22,000 has been set aside for his use for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1903. This is the same amount as was allowed last year, and while not enough to admit of making all the surveys asked for, averages well with the amount appropriated to other states. The rapid settling up of timber and prairie lands which are not yet surveyed makes the calls for official surveys very frequent.
