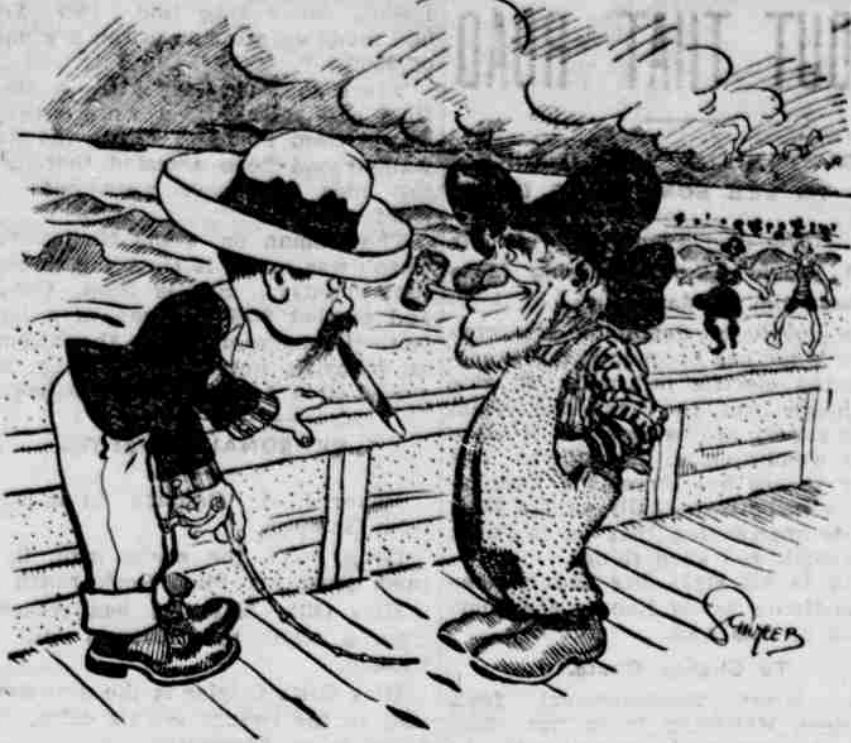

The two have met in the ring several times before and the rattling fights they put up has created considerable interest in tonight's engagement.

THE GREAT SCRAP

HEAVY WEIGHTS WILL DO BATTLE THIS EVENING.

Much interest in Fight Locally—Measurements and Weights of the Big Fellows—Pointers on the Scrap.

Much interest is expressed locally in the contest between James Jeffries champion heavyweight pugilist of the world, and Lanky Bob Fitzsimmons, ex-champion, who come together tonight at San Francisco, the former to make a chopping block of his antagonist and add an extremely dim diamond to his fistful crown, the latter to make a hard struggle against heavy odds to win back the laurels which were his so short a time.

A number of bets have been made on the result in this city, the prevailing odds being two to one on the husky champion, and arrangements are being made to receive the returns of the fight by rounds at the Gratz and one or two other resorts about the city.

Measurements of Men.

Local devotees of the "manly" art will be interested in the figures given out regarding the big fighters at the last hour before entering the ring. This is the way they read, as sent out from headquarters:

Jeffries—Height 6 feet 11 1/2 inches, weight, about 210 pounds, age 26, biceps 16 inches, neck 17 1/2 inches, chest 41 inches, waist 34 1/2 inches, thigh 25 1/2 inches, calf 17 1/2 inches. Fitzsimmons—Height five feet 11 1/2 inches, weight about 165 pounds, age 40, biceps 14 inches, neck 15 inches, chest 41, waist 32 inches, thigh 20 inches, calf 13 1/2 inches.

Thus it will be seen that the big fellow has the best of the argument on all points, and if Fitz succeeds in besting him tonight he will have to perform what may almost be considered a miracle.

About the Match.

The met met before the National Athletic club of Frisco, the match being scheduled for 20 rounds. If present arrangements are carried out the boxers will face one another shortly after 9 o'clock. According to reports from their respective training quarters, Jeffries and Fitzsimmons are both in first-class physical condition. From the hour the match was made Jeffries has been a decided favorite over Fitzsimmons in the betting. Those who have staked their money on the champion have in mind the fact that he did the trick once and can do it again.

Champion Has Improved.

It is conceded by all followers of the game that Jeffries has improved in science since he won the championship. He is no longer the free-arm fighter of the dashaway school. His best hold is a left rip, such as Dixon used with great execution in his palmy days. He is also handy with the right at the ribs. He is quick on his feet, gritty and aggressive and with his many natural advantages it is difficult to figure out how the Cornishman can withstand his sledge-hammer blows.

Jeff Was a Bruiser.

In the old days Jeff slashed out in a wholesale way, paying little regard to pugilistic economies. He had a habit of striking with the big joints of his thumbs. As a consequence he frequently crippled his hands early in the contest, and for the balance of the time he was as helpless as a dismasted vessel wallowing in the trough of a heavy sea. During the past three years, however, he has met and defeated a number of good men and in addition has sparred a lot with such past masters of the craft as Tommy Ryan, and it is but natural that he should derive benefit from keeping such good company. It may be safely assumed therefore that Fitzsimmons will tonight face a far more scientific

fighter than the pugilist at whose hands he met defeat at Coney Island.

Hard to Figure for Fitz.

With these facts borne in mind it is difficult to figure out how the Cornishman has any show to lower Jeffries' colors. But those best acquainted with ring matters know that Fitzsimmons is no ordinary mortal. He has outlived, in an athletic sense, all the middle and heavyweights of his generation. He has reversed the rule by building up in muscle and substance when symptoms of physical shrinkage might be looked for. He is to all intents and purposes a late flowering plant, and it is just possible that the respite of two years since he did any fighting has benefited rather than injured him.

Would Cause Little Surprise.

While shrewd bettors naturally favor the champion there are many who would not be surprised if victory perched on the banners of Lanky Bob. For Fitzsimmons is a man of surprises. On more than one occasion he has turned apparent defeat into victory. By his tactics he has kept opponents away from him when they might have finished him. Others he has led on only to put them hors de combat when they least expected it. He still retains that old famous knock-out blow. Unless he has retrograded more than critics suppose he is still one of the most dangerous men in the world at close quarters. While apparently awkward and shambling in the ring, in reality he is all eyes and fists, and, possessing force, no one knows better how to apply it.

Both in Good Condition.

As regards condition, both men appear to be in excellent fettle. While their modes of training differ neither fighter has left a stone unturned to harden himself for the contest. A long fight is not expected. Each man is a willing performer and the result should be arrived at before half a dozen rounds have been fought. Fitzsimmons realizes that his only chance rests in keeping away from the big champion long enough to get in that one knock-out blow of his. And it will have to be a hard blow at that for Jeffries, with his massive jaw and thick ribs, is built for heavy weather and above all he possesses recuperative powers which Fitzsimmons naturally lacks because of his advanced years.

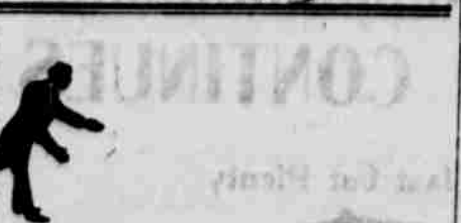
