A cholera plague is raging in Egypt.

Senator Mitchell will accompany the senate committee to Hawaii. The committee will sail from San Francisco August 26.

Close of the Boer war has caused a boom in the British marriage market. The returned veterans are all taking unto themselves wives, who were not already married.

St. Louis is delighted that she will have the opportunity of entertaining the brother of the Chinese emperor at her fair soon. There will also be other Chinese there of the royal blood.

The Canadian Pacific will put on a line of ships between Canada and England. The service will be between Halifax and Liverpool in winter, and between Liverpool and Quebec in summer.
