## HOME COUNTY NEWS

### WESTON AND VICINITY.

#### Happening of the Week as Reported by the Leader.

The Degree of Honor had special work at the Workman lodge Tuesday night, and took the occasion to have an ice cream social for the members, which was enjoyed by those privileged to be present.

J. F. Melton, the well known pioneer who was among the first settlers in this locality, is dangerously sick with Bright's disease. He has been moved from Lind, Wash., to St. Mary's hospital at Walla Walla.

The pipe for Weston's fountain has arrived at Athena from Olympia over the Northern Pacific. The shipment consists of 2144 feet of 3 1/2 inch wood pipe, costing 14 cents a foot. The ditch has been excavated, and a mechanic will be here tomorrow from Walla Walla to commence work on the concrete basin.

Henry Pinkerton is cutting 30 acres of his wheat near town with a binder. It is absolutely flat, and must all be cut that way, making a difficult and tedious task, but Mr. Pinkerton feels content, as he estimates the yield at 50 bushels per acre. He has 80 acres more which he will head and thresh.

Jas. Stanfield was up from Adams Sunday; he reports that barley harvest commenced in that vicinity last week. J. T. Lienallen of that place has 160 acres of barley, which before

the late wind storm was estimated to yield 60 bushels per acre; upon putting his combine at work upon it, it was found that only about 15 bushels to the acre had been left unthreshed by the storm.

F. H. Beathe manager of the Young chopmill above town, has perfected an arrangement which will be found very convenient for harvesters who want to fill their water tanks. About 500 feet of pipe has been laid from the spring to the bridge, running a three-inch stream of water, and it is only necessary to turn the water into his tank and smoke his pipe in restful peace while awaiting a load.

Tuesday afternoon, 80 acres of wheat belonging to William Reser, near Walla Walla, was entirely destroyed by fire. It is supposed to have ignited by sparks from a locomotive. Tuesday morning, John Cummings, a wealthy farmer, lost \$5,000 worth of property by a fire near Touchet station, which destroyed a barn, granary, hay vehicles, and three blooded calves. Sparks from a "steam combine" caused the destruction of 30 acres of wheat for A. L. Knight on the reservation Monday.

Dan R. Kirk, formerly of Weston, is now one of the extensive farmers of the Eureka Flat country, near Clyde, Wash., where he has rented a large acreage for six years. He is preparing to harvest 1,500 acres, and expects an excellent crop. Besides, he has 1,700 acres of summer fallow. The size of Mr. Kirk's farming plant may be judged from the fact that he uses 44 work horses, which are kept in a portable canvas barn, resembling a circus tent. However, he is a comparatively small rancher in the Eureka Flat country where his nearest neighbor farms 6,000 acres.

#### NO TRACE OF CAMPBELL.

His Disappearance From Freewater Still Continues.

Freewater, July 26.—No word of Robert Campbell has ever come back to Freewater, and Campbell's fellow townsmen have almost given up hope of seeing him again. The missing man was a local hotel-keeper, having been lessee of the Talbott House. About six weeks ago or more he gave up his lease to Mrs. Anderson, and suddenly disappeared from Freewater. For days neighbors waited to hear some tidings, and the disappearance gradually became a nine days' wonder, which is now dying out. Mrs. Campbell and child remain here. Campbell was a large, portly man.

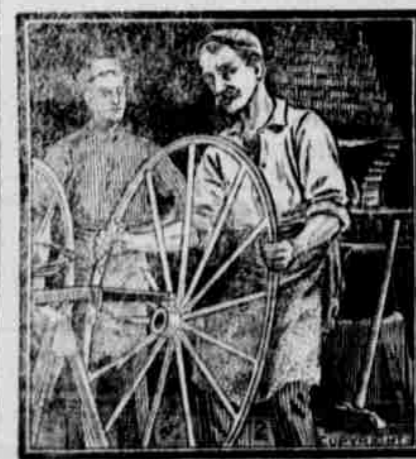
